The health of the English army continued excellent, and, in the previous week, there had been no deaths. There was a strong report of an approaching change in the supreme management of the medical department. Dr. Hall, it is said, is coming to England, and Dr. Alexander will reign in his stead, as inspector-general of hospitals in Turkey. The promotion of the latter gentleman would give general satisfaction, for he has served in the Crimea from the very commencement of the war, without ever being absent from his duty, and his high

qualifications as an army surgeon are well known and universally admitted.

The winter had ceased, and the weather had become very pleasant. The White works at Sebastopol were blown up on the 28th of February. These works were formerly barracks, and formed the north and west sides of a square, whose third side was merely a wall.

Russian accounts from the Crimea state that their army is suffering dreadfully from typhus. The recruits and the militia corps were decimated by epidemic diseases

Other accounts confirm the information previously received of the preparations being made by the Russian government in the event of hostilities being renewed in the spring. Steam gunboats will be added to the flotilla of row-boats for the defence of the Baltic coast. The fleet at Cronstadt has been considerably increased, and the levies of sailors, recently made, have filled up the blanks made by the war at Sebastopol. All the coast of Finland is covered with troops, and most of the reserves of the guard have been placed in garrison there. General Barassoff, one of the aides-de-camp to the emperor, has, in company with an inspector-general of the artillery and one of the engineers, visited all the fortress, and has gone as far as Helsingfors. The report made to the emperor is very favourable, and it mentions among other points, the good feeling of the inhabitants. The Invalide Russe completes the nomination of the officers of the militia, which now, it asserts, represents a force of 350,000 men. They are armed with muskets, hatchets, and sike. and pikes.
