

longer than I intended. I originated in my anxiety not to occasion disappointment by announcing measures that might or might not be carried into effect.

Crimea.—Delegata from the two armies had met to regulate the details of the Armistice.

The fall of Kars.—The papers relating to the fall of Kars have been laid before Parliament, published in the Blue Book. They embrace the whole subject of the war, the defence and fall of Kars, the conduct of Lord Stratford, the proceedings of the Allied Generals, and the Policy of the Allied movements.

Omar Pacha's plan was to make a powerful diversion from Redoubt Kaleh, with the view of compelling them to raise the siege of Kars. This project found favour in the Turkish Councils at Constantinople.

France.—Latest.—March 7.—The Moniteur contains an Imperial decree calling out for active service, 140,000 young soldiers for the class of 1855.

Hamburg.—March 6.—Admiral Watson has sailed from Kiel, and has ordered the fleet to assemble off Moar Island to announce the renewal of the blockade of the Russian ports.

Baltic.—The Russians are sending troops in considerable numbers to Finland, concentrating a large force around St. Petersburg, and strengthening the batteries near Cronst.

Britain.—In Parliament Napier brought forward his motion for committee of enquiry into management of the Baltic Fleet, but after some words with Sir James Graham, and Admiral Berkeley, motion was withdrawn.

France.—Little stranger hourly expected. Prussia.—Von Hinkeldy, Minister of Police, killed in duel by Captain Hochow.

Norway.—Commercial crisis. Persia.—Hostile attitude assumed towards Indian possessions. Expedition talked of being fitted out by Indian government.

Austria.—Further reduction of the army announced. Baltic.—The Firefly had entered Keil with a despatch from Government, requesting Commodore Watson, not to engage in hostilities.

Probable dissolution of Parliament in May. True bills found against Wm. Palmer for murder of Cooke and Ann Palmer.

Strong easterly winds—many homeward bound ships off the coast. No markets reported.

TO MIRAMICHI GLEANER OFFICE

Halifax March 28. Canada arrived at half-past seven in the evening.

Mr Dallas had arrived in England. Buchanan dined with the Lord Mayor of London, and made conciliatory speech, which had good effect.

No excitement exists in England upon American affairs. Peace Conferences.—Favourable. All accounts agree to this—a Despatch from Berlin of the 12th says—Count Orloff has made known at St. Petersburg, that a definite understanding has been come to on the 5th point, and that thanks to the instructions brought by Mr Deschoewaff, peace is assured.

Some special deliberations which are to take place between Russia and Turkey, have been reserved.

Preparations are going on at Moscow for the Coronation of the Emperor after peace is concluded.

Prussia has been invited to join the Conference as the signer of the treaty of 1841, and has appointed Baron Mantuffel, and Hatzfeld, Plenipotentiaries.

Crimea.—Armistice proclaimed on the 1st March. Sickness among the French and Russian troops.

Turkey.—Ministry occupied with measures to alleviate commercial crisis. Free export of Breadstuffs is permitted from Southern ports.
