LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL CHAMBER,
21st April, 1854.

Resolved, unanimously, That from and after the close of the present Session, no Grant of Money to any Parish School Teacher will be assented to by this House, unless the same be recommended by the Board of Education, whether the service be performed before or since the passing of the Act 15 Victoria, Chapter 40.
Resolved, That no Bill, Resolution, or other proceedings founded upon any application addressed to the House of Assembly, be sustained by the Council, unless an application to the same effect, with such documents as may accompany the same, be also presented to the Council in General Assembly.

NEW BRUNSWICK HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

The following was adopted as a standing rule in the Sessions of October, 1854:—
26th.—That no Bill of a private nature, or Petition for money and relief, shall be received by the House after the fourteenth day from the opening of the Session, both inclusive; and that the Clerk of this House do, one month previous to the meeting of the Legislature, cause fifty printed copies of this Rule to be sent to each of the Clerks of the Peace in the several counties, for distribution, and cause the same to be inserted in the Royal Gazette, and two Newspapers in such County where Newspapers are published.
