They have their own State behind them, and can find safetheir own State bening them, and can had sate-ty in retreat, and renew their invasion at plea-sure. Thus the interposition of the general, government will act directly and fatally upon the Free State inhabitants, by depriving them of the supplies of men and arms which they solicit from the Northern States for their de-formed and arms which they fence ; and as soon as the government forces have performed this mission and retired, the work of destruction and massacre may in safety begin.
