"In the first place, travelling by rail-road is scarcely faster than by post; and that is very fast for Spain, where the rapidity of a journey depends upon the trot of a mule. You start fast for Spain, where the rapidity of a journey depends upon the trot of a mule. You start off; for two or three hours you trot by steam; suddenly the train stops: you put your nose out. What's the matter ? what has happen-ed ?' Nothing at all uncommon; the stokers and engineers of the train have got up a pronun-viamento; they will not budge if the govern-ment is not changed. You are obliged to re-main in the open air, until the Governor of the next town can send a regiment with its fieldnext town can send a regiment with its field-pieces to bring the rebels to reason, and enable the travellers to proceed on their journey

" It will be the same in Portugal : from other causes, if you please, but the result will be the same.

"They dream of rail-roads in Russia. Oh ! what a joke ! Rail-roads carry you fast, when what a joke : Rain-roads carry you fast, when they are working; but they require a vast number of employes. Now, people who have once only had to do with Russian functionaries ave had enough of them.

"The man who weighs your baggage must

gratuity. "And when that first gratuity has been giv-

en, you are required to give a second, under pretext that you have forgotten to give the first, and a third, under pretext that the second has not been received. And thus it will be, as long as Russians are employed, and the em-

ployed are Russians. "Now let us say a word of Turkey. Just try to make Mossulman fatalism comprehend the necessity for signals. Two trains meet, and are smashed. It was decreed !

"A train runs off the track. It was degreed !

" A rail is broken. It was decreed !

"A raif is broken. It was decreed ! "Bring me then the station-man Giaffar be-fore the Cadi. "Giaffar,' says the magistrate, 'why didst thou not make the signal agreed upon to stop

the train ?'

" ' Because I was prostrated towards Mecca, as the Prophet commands it should be done

three times a day. " Why didst thou, in spite of the severest orders, allow that arabi-driver to cross the track ?

" Because I was about to perform my ab-Iutions, that the Koran ordains. Besides, the driver was a Giaour.' The Cadi renders the following judgment ;

. .. . Whereas, in the first case the station-man was prostrated towards Mecea, and in the se-cond case was performing his ablutions; and

considering further that the driver of the araba was a Giaour, we dismiss the complaint against the aforesaid Giaffar. Allah ! Bismillah ! Allah !'

" I say nothing about Italy. All the world knows well that rail-roads are quite out of the question in the Roman States.

"Brigands will not indeed stop the trains ; the trains will stop of their own accord. " Stoker, why don't we go on ?"

" 'I'm stopping a minute to give my com-rade Lazzarini time to rifle the passengers; af-ter that, we shall go on again. Lazzarini is, so far, only at the second-class ears. Have patience ; your turn will come soon.

"For my part, added the fanciful Cascaret in conclusion, I'm not sorry to see that certain countries yet keep clear, and will always keep clear, of the invasion of Rail-roads. Where would be the pleasure of travelling if there were no longer a sledge, or a mule, or a *vetturi-*no? It's quite had enough that they have de-prived us of coaches."
