

Horrible Accident.—Boy Eaten by a Bear.—Near Rocky Point in Greenbrier county, Va. at the residence of Wm. T. Mann, George Fox about fifteen years old was instantly killed and partly eaten up by a large pet bear belonging to Mr Mann. The circumstances are as follows: This boy had on the day previous been out hunting and killed a ground hog, and in carrying or skinning the same got some blood on his clothes. He not having changed his clothes went about the bear, as was usual for every one when the bear laid hold of him around the body and squeezed him until his ribs were broken, then knocked the boy down with his paw and eat very nearly all the flesh off his face and legs before he was dead. There being no one about the house but a lady, she was unable to relieve him.

CALIFORNIA.

New York, Nov. 13th.—Steamer George Law, from Aspinwall 3d, arrived this morning. She brings San Francisco dates of the 20th ult., and upward of \$1,600,000 in treasure.

The news from California is meagre. The markets during the fortnight had been excessively dull, and prices nominal.

The primary elections in San Francisco had resulted in favor of the Broderick faction.—The Republicans had withdrawn their County ticket, and adopted the people's nominees.

A collision occurred in Chilton Valley, Mendocino County, between the whites and a party of Indian cattle thieves. Fifty of the latter were killed.

Advices from Southern California state that ex-Governor Gandara, had attempted to revolutionize Sonora, but was baffled, and fled to the Indians.

A severe earthquake shock was felt at San Diego on the 29th of September.

Diplomatic relations have been suspended between England and New Grenada, in consequence of the latter government failing to liquidate the Macintosh claim. The British and West India fleet has been ordered there to enforce the claim.

Niagara arrived at midnight.

Lord Palmerston made a speech at Liverpool, in reply to president of Commerce, relative to his policy towards the United States, His Lordship replied with considerable embarrassment of manner, and said that the policy adopted recently must meet with the approbation of the Chamber of Commerce, he further said that this result had borne out the wisdom of that course.

At Manchester, Lord Palmerston used the following expression, which has been the subject of much remark:—"I hope the peace will be lasting, but its endurance must depend on the fidelity with which its conditions are fulfilled; if that Power which provoked hostility faithfully carried out the Treaty, then no doubt Peace will be long preserved.

Directors of Bank of England have made further change in the rates of Discount, with a view to improve the Exchanges, and to meet continued outflow of gold.

Condition of Bank of France shows no improvement.

Admiral Dundas is still at Malta.

Fears of Caffre war at Cape of Good Hope are passing away.

British Government advertises at Lloyd's for a ship to convey some hundred Emigrants to Nova Scotia, to grant free passages.

A semi-official Editorial in the Constitution, on the Question at issue between French and English Governments, speaks plainly and says the presence of the Naval Squadron of England in the Black Sea, and of the Austrian Troops in the Principalities, are henceforth only an arbitrary and violent means of preventing a solution of the difference which Russia has been the first to propose.

It has been rumoured for some days back in Paris that the French Fleet was about to proceed to the Black Sea, it is however doubtful. Paris Patrie says Neapolitan difficulties are in a better phase.

It is thought that a friendly engagement will be come to through the Russian Minister at Naples.

According to recent agreement with the Pope, the Austrians are withdrawing their troops from several towns in the Papal Legation, at the same time Austria is making preparations for an overwhelming display of military force in Lombardy.

The Commission on the Navigation of the Danube is about to re-assemble at Vienna.

Prussian letters say that the relations between France and Prussia are becoming closer. Private statements say that Prussia agrees with France and Russia, in requiring Austria to evacuate Principalities, and English Fleet to leave the Black Sea.

The Emperor Alexander has addressed a letter to General Luders, granting him leave of absence for twelve months. Emperor says:—"Appreciating your effective services, I hope that if circumstances give me occasion to recall you to employment before the expiration of the period named, you will come to resume your duties with the zeal and alacrity which have ever signalized your military career."
