

We learn from trustworthy sources, that the Prohibitory Law is in the most beneficial operation in St. Stephen. UNITED STATES.

The Weather in Barnstable County, Mass.—We learn from the Yarmouth Register that hardly any services have been held in the various churches of the country for the last two weeks, owing to the inclemency of the weather, and the clergy have consequently had an easy time of it.

The excessive cold weather too, has been particularly severe upon the eels on the coast, who had not sufficient warning to get into their winter quarters of mud, and consequently were overtaken by the frost and frozen stiff as pokers. Hundreds of bushels of them were driven ashore, and raked up on the beach, and after being packed in barrels, shipped for the city markets. They sell readily in New York at from 10 to 12 cents per pound.—Boston Journal.

Ravages of the Cholera at Porto Rico.—A letter received in this city from St. Thomas, dated Dec. 18, states that accounts received there from St. John, P. R., are to the effect that business was utterly prostrated by the ravages of the cholera, the number of cases, so far, in that city, according to the official statement, being 3500, with the large percentage of 1599 deaths. The disease had not spread in the surrounding country to any great extent.

Congressional—Washington, Jan 24.—In the House Mr Fuller withdrew his name as candidate for the Speakership, and expressed the hope that the House would now adopt some plan by which the present difficulties might be settled.

In the Senate, Mr Clayton presented a communication which had been received from the President in Executive Session, and from which the injunction and secrecy had been removed, transmitting a copy of a letter from Lord John Russell to Mr Crampton dated January 19th 1853, in which it is declared that the British Government intend to adhere strictly to the treaty of Washington of the 19th April 1850, and not assume any sovereignty, direct or indirect in Central America.

Mr Clayton moved that the letter be transferred from the Executive to the Legislative journal, and printed. He then expatiated on the usurpations of Great Britain, and the tortuous diplomacy of the ministry, stigmatizing as monstrous and disgraceful.

Mr Cass desired to speak, but not being well he yielded the floor to Mr Mason, who thought that debate was not now exactly proper, but definite action by the Executive. So far as he had read the documents, they show a purpose on the part of Great Britain—a total disregard of treaty stipulations with this country.

When the question shall be presented to the Senate or Congress in a tangible form by the Executive, there would be no difference of opinion as to the incumbent duty of this government. England will be held to a strict performance of her treaty stipulations.

Mr Seward agreed with Mr Mason that debate ought not to be indulged in till the House is organized. Still he thought there ought to be no unnecessarily delay in the settlement of the controversy with England. Unnecessary delay is indecision often loses a good cause, while decision as often gains bad ones.

Mr Cass saw no reason why this subject should not be fully discussed before the American people, and moved to postpone the further consideration of the subject until Monday next.—Agreed to.

Subsequently a message was received from the President stating that circumstances have occurred to disturb the course of the government in Kansas, producing a condition of things which renders it incumbent on his to call the attention of Congress to it. He urgently recommends the adoption of such measures as the exigency seem to require. He alludes to the misdirected zeal of the propagandist emigration as the cause of the clashing of the slavery and anti-slavery interests, and emphatically condemns the efforts to anticipate or force a determination of that question in this inchoate state.

Tongue Frozen Fast.—In Cincinnati, on the 10th, one boy induced another to put his tongue against a fluted iron lamp post—the thermometer at the time indicating a temperature far below zero. The tongue stuck fast, of course, and the poor boy suffered great agony. Several persons endeavoured to release him, but in vain. Matters were in this situation for five minutes, when a gentleman named Taylor went into the Telegraph House and brought some hot water and whisky, with which he bathed the tongue of the suffering boy, finally liberating about one-half, leaving the other sticking to the post, where it remained for the balance of the day, a warning to youngsters how they recklessly lick cold iron in freezing weather. The luckless boy was taken to his home in extreme agony.
