Tremendeus Snow Storm.—Serious Detention of Railroad Trains—No Mastine Disasters Reported.—On Baturday night and Sunday foremoon, we had a snow storm which for continuous severity has seldom been equiled in latter years. The storm commenced at the South, probably as early as Friday aight or Saturday morning, for dispatches from Washington, Baltimore, Philadelphia, and New York, of Saturday evening at 9 o'clock, a foot of snow had already fallen, with a prospect of a continuance through the night. At New York, on Saturday evening, the wind blew a hurricane, and in some places the snow was two feet deep. The storm followed the coast, until it reached Halifax, where we hear that a severe gale commenced. Halifax, where we hear that a severe gale com-menced yesterday morning, and the streets were

blocked with drifts of snow.
In this vicinity, the storm set in about noon on Saturday, and continued with increasing violence during the night, and until nearly noon yesterday, when the clouds broke away and the sun came out bright and warm. Friday night was the coldest of the season, and Saturday morning was very cold, with evident signs of the impending contest of the elements. The anow fell gently at first, and it was not until evening that the storm burst upon us in all its fury, During some portions of the night the wind blew a hurricane, and those who were exposed to its action bear testimony to the great demands it made upon their physical energies. The amount of snow which fell is veriously estimated from fifteen inches to two feet; probably the average is about 18 inches, and very badly drifted, in some places filling the roads even with the fences. In this city the snow lies in the streets on an average nearly two feet above the sidewalks. The quantity of snow and ice on the houses and in the streets is immense, and will iequire a good deal of labor pro perly to dispose of it. In the country, the snow was blown almost entirely out of some roads, while in others it lies in hills Some idea of the depth of the snow in our

streets may be formed from the fact that Hathorne & Co. started for their stable at Williams Market yesterday morning, with four four-horse-sleighs to break out the way to Chelsea Ferry, and about one hundred men to shovel. The teams did not reach the ferry until about to clock in the afternoon—about 7 hours going three miles.

In several of the churches in this city, no services were held yesterday. At Rev. Dr. Low-ell's, the "enerable pastor of which was expected to preach his half century discourse, no service was held. The interesting ceremonies of this occasion will probably take place at some future day .- Boston Journal, Jan. 7.
