RULES AND REGULATIONS.

NOTICE is hereby given that In pursuance of Resolutions passed by the Committee on the 14th and 21st May, 1856, the Rules and Regulations of Lloyd's Register of British and Foreign Shipping have been amended as follows :--

Section 35 .- Ships intended to be built under Specal Survey, must be placed under the Surveyors' inspection from their commencement so that all parts of the Timbers, Deadwood, Keel, Stem, &c., may be

of the limbers, Deadwood, Reel, Stem, etc., may be examined. The "first Survey" prescribed by this rule is to be held "When the frame is completed, timbers dubbal fair inside and outside ready to receive planking and before any planking is wrought."

Section 39.-The thickness of the "thick strakes" required when ships are built with double floors, is defined in Table B.

Section 41.—The following words in the 7th line of this Rule have been omitted, viz.,—"fitted as stan-dards or hanging knees (the latter being preferred,)" thus requiring all the knees to hold beams to be fit-ted as hanging knees. Section 46.—Allowing additional periods to ships fastened with copper and yellow metal to the entire exclusion of iron, which has hitherto been confined to ships of the six years' grade and upwards, will in future be extended to ships of all grades. The following have been added to the exemptions

The following have been added to the exceptions in this Rule as fastenings which may be of iron': viz., the upper bolt in knee of head, and bolts in arch plates provided they do not go through the outside plank.

The foot-note to this Rule has been emitted, thus rendering it imperative that the lower edge of the garboard strakes be properly bolted.

garboard strakes be properly bolted. Section 53 will stand as follows :--Ships built in the United Kingdom, or in Quebeo after 1851, or St. John, New Brunswick, ster 1853, or Miramichi, and Northern Ports of New Brunswick, or in Prince Edward's Island after 1855, and not Swreyed while Building by the Surveyors to this Society ; and all Ships the owners or builders of which may have re-fused or declined to permit them to be surveyed at the several periods prescribed by the Rules, will have One Year deducted from the period which would otherwise have been assigned, in consequence of their not having been submitted to survey during their construction.-In no case, however, will a higher grade than 10 A be assigned to Ships built in the United Kingdom, which shall not have been Sarveyed while building. Section 59 has been amended as follows, com-

Section 59 has been amended as follows, com-mencing at the eighth line: -- "At the termination of the several periods assigned to ships remaining on the character A, will have the character A struck through, and the word "*Lapsed*" inserted against them; and if not re-surveyed prior to the re-printing of the Register Book, they will appear with-out any character. out any character.

Section 67.—The following has been added as a foot note, viz.:—In[cases where ships have been doubled with deubling of less thickness than is prescribed by, or not fastened in accordance with the Rules, it will not be imperative that such doubling be stripped at the expiration of seven years; but, if upon survey, the doubling be found in good con-dition, the period for its remaining on may be extended, with sanction of the Committee, to a term not exceeding ten years, provided the doub-ling below the wales be coppered or yellow metal fastened or treenailed. Section 67 .- The following has been added as a foot
