

**Important from Nicaragua.**—New York, Jan. 29.—The British mail steamer Thames arrived at Aspinwall from Greytown, and reports that Walker, with a force of 500 men, was surrounded by his enemies, who had offered him terms of capitulation, which he would probably accept.

The Magdalena Company's steamer foundered off Savanilla, December 23rd. Twelve men including the chief engineer and the mate perished.

Two heavy shocks of an earthquake were felt at Panama, on the 13th of January.

The heaviest snow storm ever known here occurred on Monday the 29th ult. The snow fell, for an hour or two and covered some of the hills adjacent to the city. The Contra Costa range of mountains were covered several inches deep, and the snow has not yet entirely disappeared.

The city was visited by a very severe gale of wind and heavy rain on the night of the 30th. The waters of the bay were greatly agitated, but no damage of a serious character had occurred to the shipping.

**Havana News.**—Charleston, Jan. 28.—Heavy storms have occurred, and numerous wrecks are reported: among them the ship Caspian of Bath, Trufant at Barncora, and the Captain lost. The British ship Crown was on Pacific reef.

**CANADA.**

The River St. Lawrence is said to be completely frozen as far down as the Parish of St. Michael, 15 miles below Quebec.

The Quebec Morning Chronicle says that between £600,000 and £700,000 of the new preferential bonds of the Grand Trunk Railway Company had been sold in England when the Asia left.

**NEW BRUNSWICK.**

**New Steamer for the River.**—Messrs. Hatheway & Small have recently launched a new steamer, of very superior model and finish.—She is called the 'Emperor.' Her length is 180 feet, breadth of beam 28 feet. She will be ready for running early in the following spring.

Last Saturday the thermometer was only 38 below zero.—*Carleton Sentinel.*

**The Loss of the Ship Ashburton.**—Capt. Thos. M. Smith, of this City, has received a letter from Mr. Kent, Light-house keeper at Grand Manan, giving the following additional particulars of the loss of the ship Lord Ashburton, which was briefly announced in our last:—

Grand Manan, 21st January, 1857.  
On Monday morning last, the 19th inst., a ship of about a thousand tons called the Lord Ashburton, Captain Crearer came on shore at the northern head of this Island, in a violent snow storm from the North East, and in less than half an hour became a most complete wreck, the hull broken into a thousand pieces, and the sails, torn into shreds, strewn along the rocks, she had a crew of twenty-nine men, eight of whom were found alive, but with the exception of one, were dreadfully frozen.—The next day, sixteen bodies were picked from amongst the pieces of wreck fearfully mangled. None of the officers were saved. She was said to be in ballast.

**The Shrievalty of York.**—We learn that W. A. McLean, Esq., has been appointed Sheriff of York County, in place of the late B. Wolhaupter, Esq. The appointment is said to give general satisfaction.—*New Brunswicker.*

**Fires in Portland.**—On Saturday morning at about four o'clock, three houses in the vicinity of St. Luke's Church, Portland, were burned.

At 8 o'clock a fire broke out in the workshop of Mr. McKee, boat builder, in the rear of Paradise Row. The adjoining property was saved, but the shop was entirely consumed. Two of the houses belonged to Messrs. Wasson, and were insured.

**LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL CHAMBER,**  
21st April, 1854.

Resolved, unanimously, That from and after the close of the present Session, no Grant of Money to any Parish School Teacher will be assented to by this House, unless the same be recommended by the Board of Education, whether the service be performed before or since the passing of the Act 15 Victoria, Chapter 40.

Resolved, That no Bill, Resolution, or other proceedings founded upon any application addressed to the House of Assembly, be sustained by the Council, unless an application to the same effect, with such documents as may accompany the same, be also presented to the Council in General Assembly.
