relief of Lucknow, as far as Busheergunge, was in consequence of the amount of sickness, cholera having broken out severely, obliged to fall back four miles, to enable the sick to be sent to Cawnpore. Lucknow, by the lastaceounts, was holding out. The officiating Chief Commissioner, Major Banks, had been killed.

Havelock advancing on Lucklow.—We have received by express Calcutta letters and papers to the 8th of August. We have great gratification in announcing that the statement by telegraph of General Havelock's retreat to Cawnpore was incorrect. The fact is, that on the 30th and 31st he sent back his sick and wounded to Cawnpore, and having received reinded to Cawnpore, and having received rein-forcements, he recommenced his march to Luckforcements, he recommenced his march to Lucklow, on the 1st of August. It was expected
that he would arrive at Lucklow on the 8th,
and that the garrison at that place would be well
able to hold out until relieved. The movement
which gave rise to the erroneous report of General Havelock's retreat was one which became
necessary under the peculiar circumstances of
the case. After his latest reported victory, he
simply retrogaded to within a few miles of the
Ganges for three objects. First, he desired to
relieve his column from the encumbrance of
the sick and wounded, whose numbers did not
enly diminish his force, but impede its movements. Secondly, he approached the Ganges ments. Secondly, he approached the Ganges to get within reach of reinforcements which he knew to be at hand, and those reinforcements arriving more than supplied the gaps in his force caused by war and disease. Thirdly, he found on advancing into the Oude country that every little place was fortified, and had its gun or guns: and he desired to strengthen his own artillery from the park of Cawnpore. It follows from this that General Havelock simply executed a soldierly manœuvre, and fell back in order that he might bound forward again with more effect even than before. There was thus no retreat in the serse intended by the words in the brief telegraphic summary, and General in the brief telegraphic summary, and General Havelock, after a brief halt, renewed his advance upon the capital of Oude.

There is reason to hope that the efforts made to relieve Arrah have been finally successful, and that the course of the Ganges from Calcutta to Cawnpore is free from the enemy. Troops were arriving at Calcutta, and a steady stream of reinforcements had begun to flow towards the seat of war. The report that Nena Sahib had committed suicide is contradicted on the authority of General Neill. We sincrely hope that this monster of ingratitude and cruelty will not escape justice. On the whole the additional intelligence is very
