

One hundred men were lost. The loss of coal is estimated at 300,000 bushels, valued at \$16,000. The crews were principally from Louisville and Pittsburg. The steamer Gladiator reports that other boats as far down the river as New Madrid, have been swamped and sunk. Passengers from Evansville state that the storm is terrific on the lower Ohio, and that all boats had to tie up, not one being able to run. The steamer Baltimore arrived from Marietta last evening, and reports encountering a heavy gale at Parkersburg on Saturday.

A heavy wind prevails here this morning, accompanied by rain, snow and hail. The steamer Rainbow was burnt on the morning of the 21st inst, 10 miles above Napoleon, Arkansas, and from 50 to 78 lives were lost, including all of the officers. The boat, cargo, books, and papers are a total loss.
