

this railway, up to the sixtieth mile, have been left in two sections of ten miles each—the first to Mr G. S. Marsh, and the second to Messrs. Mee and Williams. The Standard states that the works on the road are being pushed forward with energy, and that about forty miles of the line will be opened in a fortnight or three weeks.—*Courier*.

The tenders for the twelve miles of Railway from the 9 mile house to Hampton, were opened on Tuesday last and the work has been given out, and the road is to be completed and the cars running to Hampton in October, 1858.—The names of the contractors we understand cannot be officially announced until the matter is laid before the Government; but we understand that Messrs Small & Crosby have got the contract for building the stone and iron bridge at Hammond River for the sum of £12,000, the Government finding the iron; and that they intend to go to work immediately.

The Bond and Shediac Railway.—The Road was to have been open for traffic on the 1st of June; a month past that time has now elapsed and we have not heard of any other period having been fixed for the completion of the work. A month of the business season has already expired, a heavy amount of freight and passengers has been carried over the road by horses and waggons, which ought to have been conveyed in Railway Cars, and by present appearances there is no telling when the old system is to be superseded.—*Westmorland Times*.

The navigation to Woodstock by means of steamers is closed for the present. The Steamer Richmond made her last trip from Fredericton on Thursday. Unless heavy rains occur, it is not probable that the steamers will renew their trips between these two places for some weeks to come.—*Morning News*.

The Lieutenant Governor and Mr Tilley.—It might be imagined that the original difference of opinion between His Excellency and the Provincial Secretary on the policy of continuing the Prohibitory Law would have caused the Lieut. Governor to reserve his opinion of Mr Tilley's qualifications. It is not so, however. We are informed by a gentleman recently from Fredericton, that His Excellency has expressed a high opinion of Mr Tilley, stating that if he (the Lieut. Governor) had a vote for St. John, undoubtedly Mr Tilley should have it. We relate this as much for the credit it does to His Excellency's impartiality, as for the honorable testimony it is in favor of Mr Tilley by one who has a good opportunity of judging our public men in one important character, that of Councillors.—*Leader*.

NOVA SCOTIA.

The new Barracks have advanced rapidly this season, and now make a fine show. If men desert from such quarters as they are likely to have there, with such splendid views, and salubrious air, they deserve to fare worse. By the way, discontented soldiers ought to know, that numbers who have basely abandoned their Queen's service, and are now in the United States, have said they would be glad to be in their old position if they could.

His Excellency the Mayor General left town on Thursday morning, for New Brunswick, via Amherst, etc., on Military duty, accompanied by Capt. Brett and Col. LeMarehand. It is said that His Excellency will not be absent more than 8 or 10 days.

The Am. Steamer *Tug Enoch Train* arrived at this port on Saturday afternoon, from the wreck of the Am. ship *Squando*. Capt. Hennesie, reports the attempt to float the ship a failure, owing to the steam pumps not being in order.

We are rejoiced to learn that Mackarel have struck into several harbours along the Western shore, and several stops have been made. This is encouragement for our noble and hardy fishermen.—*Halifax Morning Journal*.

Four days later from Europe.

New York, July 6.

The Collins steamer *Columbia*, which sailed from Liverpool on the 24th ult. has arrived.

The political news is unimportant. Parliament was engaged in discussing the Jewish Disabilities, Ecclesiastical Affairs, and Cotton cultivation in India.

The general results of the French elections was not ascertained. In Paris the Government elects seven and the opposition three. The grain and vine crops in France were in a magnificent condition. Some popular disturbances had occurred in Spain. Additional troops had been ordered to Havana.

In England the prospects were splendid for the crops.
