That in the event of any person whatever encomering or compying the said Fountain or Tank with any description of material, to the lajury or nuisance of the water, it shall be lawful for any inhabitant to abate or remove the naisance from the said premises to a convenient distance, without being subject to damage or loss, by reason of so dobeing subject to damage or loss, by reason of so doing.
