

have been resumed along the whole line of the Caucasus.

The ratifications of the treaty signed between Russia and Persia on the 5th of January last, were exchanged at Teheran on the 18th of the same month. This treaty cedes to Russia a tract of land on the frontier of Turkey, and situate between Bayazid and Nakhehivan, giving to Russia a complete command of the Strategic road, from Trebizonde on the Black Sea to the Persian frontier by Erzerum. Russia has been endeavouring since 1828 to obtain the concession which Persia now grants. It is added that orders were immediately sent from St. Petersburg to construct a line of fortresses on the ceded territory.

The Brussels Nord publishes the details of the concessions granted by the Russian government for the great net-work of railways to be constructed within ten years, at an outlay of forty-five million pounds sterling. The conditions are substantially the same as those already announced. Amongst the contracting parties are Baring Brothers, of London, and Hope & Co., of Amsterdam.

Among the passengers by the Persia are Lord Napier, Lady, four children, tutor, and four servants.

Rules and Regulations against Coasting.

At a General Session of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, held at the Court House in Newcastle, in and for the County of Northumberland, on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of January, in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and fifty seven.

ORDERED, That the following Rules and Regulations be made and established, in pursuance of the authority vested in the General Sessions by Act of Assembly, 18 Vict., Cap. 23., Sec. 2.

"To prevent coasting on the streets and highways."

1. That no person of whatever age or description, shall coast or ride for amusement, on any sled or sleds, down any of the hills, in any street, lane, alley, highway, or public squares within the towns of Newcastle or Chatham respectively, under the penalty of ten shillings for each and every offence; and it is hereby declared to be the duty of any or either of the constables of the said towns, respectively, to take notice of and make complaint against any person or persons so offending.

11. That if any such offender be a minor, apprentice, or servant, the parent, guardian, or master of such offender, shall be liable for the payment of the penalty.

Rules and Regulations, &c.—Tank.

At a General Session of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, held at the Court House in Newcastle, in and for the County of Northumberland, on Tuesday the thirteenth day of January, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty seven.

ORDERED, That the following Rules and Regulations be made and established, in pursuance of the authority vested in the General Sessions by the Revised Statutes, Chap. 64.

"For abating and removing all public nuisances."

1. That whoever shall cast or thrown any thing whatever into the public Tank, in Newcastle, thereby rendering the water impure, unwholesome, or unfit for use, shall be guilty of a nuisance, and shall be subject to a penalty of two pounds.

11. Whoever shall in any way interfere with the Fountain which supplies the Tank, by adulterating or otherwise injuring or rendering the water impure or unwholesome, shall be subject to a like penalty of two pounds.

111. That in the event of any person whatever encumbering or occupying the said Fountain or Tank with any description of material, to the injury or nuisance of the water, it shall be lawful for any inhabitant to abate or remove the nuisance from the said premises to a convenient distance, without being subject to damage or loss, by reason of so doing.

Rules and Regulations against Ringing Bells, &c.

At a General Session of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, held at the Court House in Newcastle, in and for the County of Northumberland, on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of January, in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty seven.

ORDERED, That the following Rules and Regulations be made and established in pursuance of the authority vested in the General Sessions, by Act of Assembly, 18 Vict., Chap. 23, Sec. 2.

"To prevent the Ringing of Bells, Shouting, or other unusual noises in the Streets, Knocking at the Doors, or Ringing Door Bells."

I. That if any person or persons shall at any time ring any or either of the Bells belonging to the Towns of Newcastle or Chatham, respectively, except on alarm of Fire, such person or persons shall be liable to a penalty of twenty shillings for each and every offence; and should such ringing be in the night time, the person or persons offending, shall be liable to a penalty of two pounds for each and every offence.

11. Whoever shall shout or make any unusual noise, in or upon any of the streets, lanes, squares, wharves, within the Towns of Newcastle and Chatham, respectively, shall be liable to a penalty of twenty shillings for each and every offence; and should such shouting and noise be perpetrated during the night season and calculated to disturb the inhabitants, or any of them in either of the said towns, the person or persons offending shall be liable to penalty of two pounds for each and every offence.

111. Whoever shall knock at the door of any of the inhabitants of either of the said towns in a rude, boisterous, insulting, or improper manner, or for sport, or insult, without any proper motive or intention of gaining admittance thereby, shall be liable to a penalty of one pound for each and every offence; and should such knocking be after twelve o'clock at night, at any door or other premises, otherwise than an Inn, shall be deemed and taken as a completion of the offence without further proof, and punishable, under a penalty of two pounds.

IV. Whoever shall ring the door bell of any inhabitant of either of the said towns in a rude or insulting manner, without any legitimate object of gaining admittance, shall be liable to a penalty of one pound for each and every offence; and shall such ringing be committed after twelve o'clock at night at any door bell, otherwise than an Inn, shall be deemed and taken as a completion of the offence without further proof, and punishable under a penalty of two pounds.

V. The parents of minors, and masters of apprentices who shall transgress the foregoing rules, or either of them shall be liable for the penalty thereof.

VI. It shall be the special duty of the Constables of either of the said towns to take notice of and make complaint against any person or persons offending against the foregoing rules.
