LATEST FROM EUROPE.

Halifax, November 4.

The steamer Canada from Liverpool arrived at 8 o'clock, A. M.

BRITAIN.—Financial matters still. Most interesting portion of news in London. Wednesday 21st funds showed undiminished firmness at slight advance over Tuesday's rates; on stock exchange money was in good supply at 5 to 5 1/2 on Government securities, and at Bank and discount mart, there was absence of pressure.—Times city Article, dated Wednesday evening, says the advance in Bank rate (8 per cent.) seems greatly to have checked the exportation of gold to New York. The Arago from Southampton to-day, has taken out thirty thousand pounds from France, but only seven thousand five hundred from England, while the total by the City of Baltimore from Liverpool is only eight thousand two hundred pounds. It was intended to send twenty thousand by the latter vessel, but the Bank movement caused the principal portion to be countermanded. The quantity of goods being forwarded is very small, and this fact will tend to improve the American exchanges.

India Company gave notice of further rise of four per cent. in their rate for bills on India. On Thursday 22nd, funds exhibited great steadiness and closing at slight advance. The Times says Money Market is exceedingly quiet and owing to absence of any important failures and the signs of general stability among leading manufacturing and shipping firms throughout the country a very satisfactory feeling is observable. Uncertainty still prevails as to probable necessity of any further upward movement on part of Bank, but question will perhaps be solved before the lapse of another week. Demand was comparatively moderate both at the Bank and out of doors, numerous suspensions continue to be announced on the Continent, especially among manufacturing firms of Germany. Bank of England had thrown out some American Bills known or supposed to be connected with intended shipments of specie to the United States. On Friday funds continued buoyant. The rate of discount at Hamburg declined to 8 1/2 per cent. No Gold withdrawals from Bank. The Times says the steamer Canada takes out tenders for four hundred thousand pounds. Eight per cent bonds of Michigan Central Railroad for extinction of a portion of their floating debt. The value of money on Stock Exchange remains as low as five per cent. Daily News says demand for money at the Bank was heavy. American horse Prior is dead. Lord Macaulay has been elected High Steward of Cambridge. Papers continue to publish lengthy speeches by prominent men on affairs of India. Amongst others the Duke of Cambridge addressed the citizens of Sheffield on the occasion of laying the foundation stone for the Crimean Monument; he urged stern justice to the mutineers and stated that recruiting was progressing in a perfectly incredible manner. Mr Gladstone spoke upon the Educational question at Liverpool; he looked upon patronage as the curse and plague of the country, and hoped for the day when nearly every office will be held up in the face of the country for the prize of the best candidate. An examination of Bank rupture in the Court of London brought to light extraordinary exposures in regard to manufacture of accommodation Bills by commercial men.—The London Times taking for text a Protectionist article from an American paper, eulogizes Free Trade principles, and expresses surprise that they make such slow progress in the United States. Farewell demonstration by Temperance men given to Mr Neal Dow at Liverpool on 23rd ult., who is passenger per Canada. Monetary pressure of Banks in Ireland.

FRANCE.—The Receiver-General of taxes at Amegs suspended through Bourse speculations with a deficit in his accounts of four hundred thousand pounds. Daily News Paris correspondent writes that Governor of Bank of France went to Compigne on Tuesday prepared to ask Emperor for decree giving forced currency to Bank notes; was not likely it would be granted. Bullion in Bank of France is stated on reliable authority to have decreased thirty-five millions francs since last monthly returns. Failures expected in Paris, gold being taken from Bank of France for America. Accounts from departments through which the river Allier flows are very unfavorable, waters were rising rapidly. French three per cent closed at 68 85.

SPAIN.—New Cabinet still unorganized, Admiral Armero continues to occupy post of future Ministry, but business of various departments was transacted by under Secretaries of State. A Madrid despatch says that the Cortes convoked for October 30, will not assemble till Dec. 30.

BELGIUM.—Bank of Belgium advanced its rate of discount to 5 1/2 per cent. Bank of Denmark has increased its rate of discount from 5 to 6 per cent.

PRUSSIA.—King was regarding his health very slowly; indeed it is inferred that his physicians, when officially called upon, will have to give such a certificate in regard to probability of King being able to resume his monarchical functions as will warrant the constitutional assumption of Regency by Prince of Prussia.

AUSTRIA.—The Vienna correspondent of London Times writing on the 19th says, that during last two or three days there had been a

lull in financial pressure, but considered probable crisis very far from being at end; not improbable other Italian States will follow example of Parma in withdrawing from Austrian customs union.

SWITZERLAND.—Letter from Scurich states thirty commercial houses principally in silks and ribbon trade failed there.

ITALY.—The Pope was paying his promised visit to Civita, Vecchia, where he was greeted with various demonstrations of respect.

TURKEY.—A telegraphic despatch dated Jassy, Oct. 19th, states that Divan had that day come to resolution recognizing rights of Porte and in favor of union of Principalities, under a constitutional Sovereign chosen from one of Western dynasties, a representative form of Government and neutrality of State. The Wallachian Divan had arrived at similar result. Constantinople, Thursday.—The Turkish Ministry has been overthrown. Ridschid Pacha has been appointed Grand Vizier; Riza Pacha Minister of War; Yassir Pacha -o the Imperial Guard, and Fetri Pacha to the Artillery. The Duke of Oporto brother of King of Portugal, spoken of as likely candidate to throne of United Principalities. France is now said to regret that question of Union has gone so far, because serious complications must arise between Austria and Russia on the subject.

INDIA.—Nothing later. Steamer "Ripon" arrived at Southampton 22nd with heavy portion of last Indian mail and numerous passengers who made hairs breath escapes from Sepoys. By tel. from London to Liverpool.—London, Saturday morning. Paris correspondent of Daily News says, that overthrow of Turkish Cabinet had long been foreseen, late Cabinet having bound its financial difficulties beyond its strength. Russian Legation at Teheran has offered to Persia division of Army of Caucasus to assist in the pacification of Kherassen. Serious collision has taken place at Frankfort between soldiers of different corps—thought that several regiments must be removed from that city. Courier de Constantinople of 16th states Divan is opposed to Russian oppositions relative to arrangements of frontiers in Asia. Nomination of Ridschid Pacha as Grand Vizier is hailed as a triumph by opponents of union of Danubian Principalities; and it is said more confidently that Porte will be supported in its policy in Principalities by England and Austria. French despatches says that Porte persists in its claim to Island of Persia and refuses offered indemnity. Vice Admiral Sir M. Berkley who had resigned his post of first naval Lord of the Admiralty it is reported will be raised to Peerage. Morning Star says it is thoroughly understood that not only Premier but all members of Cabinet have finally arranged for recall of present Governor-General of India. Daily News makes an important announcement; it understands that French Government have decided upon rescinding prohibition against export of Corn and Flour from France; to this step they are impelled in consequence of strong remonstrances from the Agricultural districts. One likely effect of the measure according to Daily News, will be to precipitate a fall in English Corn Markets, which are already depressed by high rate of interest, coupled with accounts from America.

Daily News has also another article of news which is interesting: that East India Co. are about to make some large remittances of silver to India; that they have already effected insurances to amount of at least Two Hundred Thousand Pounds. Daily News remarks in conclusion that period is evidently drawing near when expenditure entailed by Indian rebellion will exercise a more direct influence upon English market. Approaching despatch of Two Hundred Thousand or half million sterling silver by Indian House authorized to relief of local Government will probably be only the first of a series of calls upon this market.

Telegram from St. Petersburg quotes the Exchange on London as low as 36d.; at this Exchange gold ought to flow freely to this side, the reason why it does not is to be found in the fact that precious metal commands 34 per cent. premium amongst money changers, Bank only furnishes small amounts of gold to applicants. On Saturday the Count Livridio formally demanded the hand of the German Princess Stiphania of Ligmatory for his Sovereign King of Portugal. It is officially stated that it is intended to launch Great Eastern either on Nov. 3 or Dec. 2.

LONDON, Saturday, 10. 15, A. M.—During conflict at Frankfort between soldiers of Federal Garrison and men of Austrian and Bavarian Regiments, swords and bayonets were brought freely into use; great number soldiers wounded on both sides.

Servian Government has made known that plot recently discovered was of Republican character, and that chiefs of it were in communication with leaders of existing movement in Danubian Principalities.

Accounts from Constantinople state that Porte considers that Treaties have been violated by recent appearance of a Russian ship-of-war at Retschuk, and it has accordingly demanded explanations from Russian Ambassador at Constantinople.

Yellow Fever at Lisbon.—A Gibraltar date of the 7th inst., says:—the yellow fever in Lisbon is very bad.

It is stated by a recent medical writer, that there are, in the city of London, twensy medical men of reputation whose incomes range from \$25,000 to \$100,000 a year.

NOVA SCOTIA.—The weather during the past week has been violent in the extreme. Great quantities of rain have fallen almost every day attended with gale of wind mostly from the East and North East.

NOTICE is hereby given, that in pursuance of a Resolution passed this day by the Committee of Lloyd's Register of British and Foreign Shipping, the Regulation relating to ships built on peculiar principles, which was passed on the 9th July, has been extended as follows, viz:—All Ships now built, or hereafter to be classed, which are not built in accordance with the principles of the Society's Rules will be marked in the Register Book thus, ("Expl. B.S.") denoting that they are built experimentally, and are classed subject to being surveyed biennially by the Society's Surveyor.

The following has been added as a foot-note to the Rules, Section 46, viz:—"Where thick garboard strakes are used they must be belied horizontally through the keel and each other."
