At New Richmond, since the strychnine disease made its appearance, 10,435 have died, making an aggregate, so far as accounts have been received, of 60,000 hogs, valued at \$300,000, and when fattened would have been worth \$650,000."—*Montreal Herald*.

Resignation of the Crown Lands Commissioner.—The Toronto papers received by the mail last evening, contain Mr Cauchon's correspondence with his late Premier, Colonel Tache, in reference to his resignation. The letters are given below, and can be criticised by our readers, along with the remarks which they elicited from Mr Cauchon's colleagues. It must be observed, that the Ministry do not appear to have refused Mr Cauchon's demand. On the contrary, Mr Attorney General Macdonald has expressly stated that, notwithstanding the withdrawal of Mr Cauchon, "the Government were anxiously considering what would be the best mode of assisting the North Shore Railroad, and would soon be prepared with a substantial measure of aid." Of the arrangements consequent upon Mr Cauchon's retirement, nothing is yet known positively, but rumour says, and the correspondent of the Montreal Gazette believes part of it is well founded, that Mr Spence will take the Crown Lands Department, and Mr Terrill the Post Office Department. Messrs. Drummond and Loranger are both spoken of to fill the remaining vacancy. But this last the same correspondent says is the merest gossip.

NOVA SCOTIA.

The Garrison.—Several clerks, &c., in the Barrack offices, &c., have recently been, or are about to be superannuated with liberal pensions as compensation for long and faithful service.—Among these we are glad to learn that Mr Edward Sellon, who has served in the Quarter Master General's office since he was a boy, has been superannuated with a handsome pension. Sergeant Major O'Donnell, late of H. M. 76th Foot, has succeeded to the clerkship vacant by the withdrawal of Mr Walford. Mr Rigby has also been superannuated with a liberal retiring allowance. It is, we learn, a distinct understanding that all similar situations under the Imperial Government will henceforth be filled by non-commissioned officers, who have served with distinction and whose characters are in accordance with the rank they held in Her Majesty's service.—*Halifax Chronicle*.

The machinery, &c., for the inclined plans in course of construction on the Shubenacadie Canal, has arrived, and is now landing at the Steamboat Wharf, Dartmouth. We are pleased to be able to announce that the works are progressing most satisfactorily. The completion of the line of Railway to Shultz's has materially affected the trade of Dartmouth by converting the eastern traffic in another direction. The people of Dartmouth are more interested than ever in the completion of the Canal, for there can be no doubt that as soon as it is in operation Dartmouth will begin to attain that degree of industrial and commercial prosperity which her natural resources and capabilities entitle her to.—*Halifax Sun*.

Deaf and Dumb School.—It is gratifying to learn that the Legislature at the last Session granted the sum of £300 in aid of the funds of the Deaf and Dumb School of this city. The Institution has been removed to Gottingen street, in the house opposite the residence of Mrs Dupont, were additional accommodation is provided for boarding pupils at a low rate.

An interesting ceremony took place at the Grand Parade on Thursday last, at about 10 o'clock, a. m. The whole garrison, including the Royal Artillery, Royal Engineers and H. M. 62nd and 63rd Regts. of foot, headed by their respective bands, marched to that place, and forming hollow square, the commanding officer decorated with medals several of the men, after which the several corps reformed and returned to their respective quarters.—*Halifax Chronicle*.

Murder.—A railway Navy was on the evening of Tuesday last, murdered in the Shanty of a Mrs Gallagher, about six miles out of Windsor. He had been drinking in this shanty and returned to it to seek for £10 in cash which he had lost, or stolen from him, whilst there. The consequence was that a row took place between him and another man who boarded at Mrs Gallagher's and the unfortunate navy was killed. Mrs Gallagher and the man implicated in this affair, have been apprehended and lodged in Windsor gaol.

WEST INDIES.

Submarine Telegraph in the West Indies.—Meetings have been held in most of the West India Islands to hear explanations from Captain Rasloff, C. E., formerly a Danish artillery officer of distinction, relative to the project of uniting the Windward and Leeward Islands by electric telegraph with the London and Newfoundland Company's submarine cable. The enterprise has so far met with great favor at the hands of the West Indians, and it is expected that the Legislatures of each of them will come down handsomely to effect the object in view. Governor Hinks proposed that Barbadoes should pledge itself for £2,500 on behalf of the Windward Islands; British Guiana, £3,000; and Antigua, on behalf of the Leeward Islands, £1,500 per annum. He does not expect much from the smaller Islands. Trinidad appears to be very anxious to participate in the undertaking, and thus keep pace with her neighbours. Cap. Rasloff has also been successful in his appeal to the French, Danish, and Spanish islands.

EUROPE.

ENGLAND.—African Exploration.—Since our last dates from Europe, another official expedition has probably left England for the exploration of the interior of Africa, under the command of Dr W. B. Baikie, a surgeon in the British navy. The special object of the party is to promote commercial intercourse with the native tribes. They are furnished with various articles for barter and presents. At Sierra Leone a steamer is to be placed at Dr Baikie's disposal, to assist him in his operations. All the officers of the party will be entitled, during their absence, to salaries equal to double full pay. The admiralty have supplied them with scientific instruments. Their return may be looked for after two years; and in view of the valuable information which the public has derived from Dr Livingstone's investigations, we may anticipate important and interesting results from their explorations during that period.

A Debtor bailed out by his Constituents.—It appears that Mr George Hudson, M.P. for Sunderland, is still haunted by the fiends of the law, owing to the unsatisfied judgments amounting to £100,000, which are still standing out against him. Consequently, on the nomination at the late Sunderland election, his ex-majesty was seized upon by a Sheriff's officer, who served him with a writ for a considerable amount; but Mr Hudson laid claim to being exempt from the pains and penalties of the law under the peculiar circumstances in which he was then placed as a candidate. The officer of the law, therefore, found that he had no real power to arrest his ex-majesty, and took his departure; at the same time, he kept a sharp look out on the state of the poll, so that, if Mr Hudson had lost his seat, he would undoubtedly have been arrested, and placed within a debtor's cell; but, at the close of the poll, his ex-majesty was fortunate enough by a rapid coalition, to come in second in the race, and had a narrow escape from the British bailiffs. It has been stated that he is expected shortly to be made bankrupt; therefore, it is hardly expected that the hon. member will be able to take his seat in Parliament; for the splendours of the iron crown, the country seats and the enchanted mansion at Albert-gate, have passed away, and left the ex-king very poor. *Sic transit gloria mundi.*—*Berwick Advertiser*.

AUSTRIA AND SARDINIA.—The relations of the two countries wear a less threatening aspect. The Journal de Frankfort, which is in connection with the Austrian Government, states that a short time since (after the receipt of the news that a Sardinian camp was to be pitched near Alessandria), it was resolved to strengthen the garrisons of Mantua, Peschiera, and Verona. "Now, however," says the Journal de Frankfort, "the idea has been relinquished, and no fresh troops will be sent to those fortresses." A letter from Turin intimates that the Austrian Government would be propitiated if Count Cavour would retire from his post as head of the Sardinian Ministry. This would not, however, be submitted to by the Sardinians. It would be impossible for any of his opponents to form a Ministry with the present Chamber of Deputies, and if the Chamber were dissolved, the country would record its confidence in Count Cavour as unmistakably as England has just done in Lord Palmerston.
