

prise—for with some slight alterations there appears to be no great difficulty in laying down the Cable, and it has been clearly proved that you can successfully telegraph through 2500 miles of cable, and know that its submersion at a great depth had no perceptible influence in the electric current; there is no obstacle in laying it down at 5 miles an hour in greatest depth of water in the Plateau between Ireland and Newfoundland. The experience now obtained must be of great value to the Company, and it is understood that the Directors will decide whether it is best to have more cable made and try again immediately after the equinoctial gales are over, or wait until another summer."

It was reported that another attempt would be made in October to accomplish the undertaking.

The papers received by the steamers at New York, states positively, that Delhi had fallen.—The latest papers received by the America, contradicts this report. We give below the latest Despatches received in England, from the London Times of August 16, and some other news.

TRIESTE, Thursday Morning.

The Steamer, with news from Bombay of the 14th July, has arrived.

CAPTAIN JOHNSON'S DISPATCH.

The latest dispatch from Delhi is to June 27; at that date Delhi had not been assaulted.—The rebels encamped without the walls had been driven in with heavy loss. The mutineers had made several sorties, but had been invariably defeated with great slaughter, and compelled to retire under shelter of their guns. Inside the city great sickness prevailed. The stench from the dead bodies of the mutineers had produced cholera and disease, and large numbers were being daily struck down. The utmost terror reigned.

The insurgents have been overtaken by General Cortlandt near Jhanes and Hissar. They were defeated, with the loss of 200 slain left on the field of battle.

The rebellion has been suppressed at Aurunghabad by General Woodburn's flying column. There have been several further mutinies by the native troops at nine military stations in various parts of Bengal. The Punjab is still tranquil.

Reinforcements are rapidly moving up to the north. The troops of the intercepted expeditionary force for China are arriving daily at Calcutta. The Simoon landed her troops (the 5th Fusiliers) on the 2nd July.

THE GOVERNMENT DISPATCH.

The Government have forwarded to us the subjoined communication.—(From Vice-Consul Raven, dated Trieste, Wednesday Aug. 11, noon.—Received 5.26 P. M.)

Delhi had not fallen up to the 27th of June. There had been a good deal of fighting outside the fort walls. The rebels were repulsed with loss on every occasion.

General Van Cortlandt, when marching upon Jhansi and Hissar, had two engagements with the rebels near Sirsa, the last being a very decided one. The rebels fled in disorder, leaving 200 dead on the field, besides prisoners. The Punjab remains quiet.

General Woodburn's column crushed the rebellion at Aurunghabad. Intelligence has been received of the mutiny of the troops at Moradhabad, Fyzabad, Secapore, Jangore, Nowgong, Banda, Fattyghur, Mhow, and Indore.

The Governors of the Presidencies are at their respective seats. The money market was in a very unsettled state. Money difficult to be had on any terms. Government securities have given way considerably.

MR CONSUL GREEN'S DISPATCH

Alexandria, Aug. 7.

"Our force before Delhi is stated to be from 7,000 to 8,000 Europeans and 5,000 natives. The native portion of the force is proved to be trustworthy. Calcutta is more tranquil, and native bankers regaining confidence.

The papers say we have seen the worst of it, for there are no more regiments to mutiny, except those of Bombay and Madras, the fidelity of which there is no cause to suspect."

ITALY.—Piedmont.—Letters from Genoa of the 8th mention the execution of two convicts, and state that agitation continued in the hulks. A plot had been discovered, the object of which was to liberate the convicts and murder the gaolers. An attempt had been made to assassinate two officers. The Neapolitan refugees say that in publishing the manuscript left by Pisciane they mean to omit the political parts.

TURKEY AND THE EAST.—Constantinople.—Intelligence from this city is of the briefest kind. No change had taken place since the late alterations in the ministry. The ambassadors of the four Powers who had taken down their colours—France, Russia, Prussia and Sardinia—were still at Constantinople.

Frontier Fortresses.—The Porte has it is said resolved to strengthen the fortifications of Widin, and to arm them afresh, as was done in the winter and spring at Silistria and Routschouk. Several engineers have arrived on the spot to carry out the works after a plan drawn up by Omar Pacha. Strong ramparts are to be erected on the side of the Danube; 200 guns, destined for the fortress will be brought to Widin from Constantinople by the Austrian Navigation Company.

Circassia.—Circassian Affairs.—The Invincible Russe of the 1st, publishes some details of

the military operations which have lately taken place by the Russians in the Caucasus against Schamyl, of which we have had only a brief mention. Prince Orbelian, wishing to occupy the plateau of Salavatia, advanced towards that position in the middle of June. After battle with Schamyl's troops, Prince Orbelian attained the object of his movement, and got possession of the important post of Salavatia.

CHINA.—From China there is no news of importance. Trade continued uninterrupted at the northern ports.

East India Company have despatched, or are on the eve of despatching to India in all 72 vessels, conveying about 27,000 troops.

LOCAL.

LOCK-UP-HOUSE.

A Public Meeting of the Inhabitants of Chatham, was held in the Hall of the Sons of Temperance, on the forenoon of Monday last, according to public notice, to take into consideration the propriety of erecting a Lock-up-House in the Town.

On motion of W. J. Fraser, Esq.: John M. Johnson, Esq. was called to the Chair, and on motion of J. T. Williston, Esq., J. A. Pierce was requested to act as Secretary.

The meeting was numerously attended, and the proceedings were conducted with the greatest order, much more than could have been anticipated, considering the great diversity of opinion there exists on the subject, and that this was the third time the matter had been laid before the public.

On motion of George Kerr, Esq., seconded by W. J. Fraser, Esq., the following Resolution was put to the meeting. Resolved, that the time has arrived when it is desirable that a Lock-up-House should be erected in the said Town, and that the expense of erecting the same should be raised and defrayed by assessment on the Freeholders and Householdors within the District described in the Act of Assembly for erecting a Lock-up-House in the Town of Chatham.

A good deal of discussion ensued on the Resolution—those who were in favour of the measure pointed out the necessity of its erection, and the benefits that would result therefrom, while those who were opposed, strenuously urged their objections.

The question being put to the meeting, and the names recorded, there appeared for the Resolution fifty, against it ninety.

We trust this will be the last effort that will be made to carry out the object of the meeting while the present absurd law remains on the statute book. Ask the inhabitants, forsooth, to tax themselves, the thing is absurd. Is the building of a Lock-up-House in the town considered necessary for the preservation of order, and the protection of property? Surely the Representatives of the County can decide this question. If it be, then make its erection imperative on the Sessions. If they think it is not, let them at once repeal the law. But we are fearful, under the present state of affairs, that the RESPONSIBILITY would be too great for the Representatives to undertake.

THE CROPS.—The accounts from all quarters, of the growing crops, are most satisfactory, and demand our special thanks to a wise and benevolent Being, for the blessing thus bestowed on us.

THE SEASON.—We perceive that the cutting of Oats and Wheat is very general. The crop is a very abundant one, and the weather has been all that could be desired. The Potatoes look well and promise a large yield. Those that have been in market are the finest we have seen for years.

MR NELLIS.—This gentleman, who was born without arms, has during the week performed twice in the Hall of the Sons of Temperance in Chatham. The manner in which he uses his feet is most surprising, and must have been acquired by many hours of patient trial and perseverance. He purposes visiting Richibucto, Shediac, and Prince Edward Island. The audiences in both instances were very numerous, and his feats gave general satisfaction.

MACKAREL CRAFT.—The schooner Union, built by a Company the present season, to pro-

secute the Mackarel Fishery, came into port on Sunday, having secured about 300 barrels on her first experimental trip. She discharged them, and after taking in some necessary supplies, proceeded again to the fishing station, where we hope she will reap an abundant harvest. We hope next season to have the satisfaction of recording the departure of quite a fleet, owned in the port, to the Herring and Mackarel Fisheries. We consider it would be much wiser to build a few vessels from 30 to 40 tons, and fit them out for the Fisheries than spending all our capital, and employing nearly all our population, in the cutting of logs, and the manufacture of deals, to overstock the British market, as we have been doing for a long series of years, and reaping little or no profit for all our labour.

NEWCASTLE.—The Division of the Sons of Temperance, located in the Shire Town, held a Pic-Nic on Wednesday. The day was fine, and we learn the party enjoyed themselves. Not being present we cannot furnish particulars.

KENNETH BIGGER.—This individual arrived here on Wednesday, under the charge of Mr Charles Brannan, the keeper of the Jail in Fredericton, who handed him over to the Gaoler in Newcastle. He will be tried in the Supreme Court, which meets in Newcastle on the second Tuesday in September, provided he is on hand at the time, which we very much doubt will be the case.
