

COUNTY RESTIGOUCHE.

A Correspondent writing us from Dalhousie by the last mail, furnishes the following:

"June 20, This day an Inquest was held before Hugh Montgomery, Esq., Coroner, in view of the body of *Lawrence Doucette*, one of the two persons lately lost by the upsetting of a boat on returning from a ship, to which they had been conveying a pilot.

"Also on the 23rd, another Inquest was held at Black Point, by the same Coroner, on view of the body of *John Elslegger*, the other person who was lost at the same time, and by the same melancholy accident with the former. Verdict in both cases—Lost by drowning."

LEGISLATIVE NEWS.

WE refer our readers to another page for the proceedings of the House up to the time it closed yesterday; afternoon. The Governor's Speech, as we expected, foreshadows no measures of any importance to be brought down by the Government this Session.

CHURCH NEWS.—It is rumoured that the Lord Bishop of the Diocese has appointed the Revd. Charles F. Street, Curate of Nelson and Blackville, to the mission of Bathurst and its dependencies; and that the Revd. William Cruden, lately ordained a Deacon by His Lordship, will take charge of the post about to be vacated by Mr Street. The Bishop is at present engaged in giving confirmation to the Churches under his Pastoral charge in the Southern and Western parts of the Province. His Lordship expects to be thus employed for the next two months, at the end of which he returns to Fredericton, to be present at the Anniversary of the Consecration of Christ Church Cathedral—August 31. The Bishop of Nova Scotia is also visiting the churches and stations in Prince Edward Island, which still forms a portion of his extensive Diocese. His Lordship is expected at Amherst, about the beginning of next month, July. It is said that the Church of England men, at Sackville, in the County of Westmorland, are at work at their new church which comprises a deep Chancel, Nave, Tower, with its Spire, and Vestry. It is intended to have stained glass in the Eastern and Western windows, in remembrance of deceased members of the English Communion, formerly resident in the Parish. These windows will, of course be gifts to the Church; the rest of the glass required for the Nave, will be provided by the people. This Church if built and completed according to the Model and Plans, which were sent from Fredericton, will be, it is said, one of the most beautiful in the Diocese.

Some of the Scottish papers state, that the Rev. Doctor Suther, the Incumbent of St. Andrew's, Aberdeen, has been lately elected Bishop of that Diocese, the See having become vacant by the demise of the Right Rev. Doctor Skinner, for more than 40 years Bishop of that See. The Bishop elect is a son of the late Dr. Suther, for many years a resident of Truro, and Halifax, N. S., and is a graduate of King's College, Windsor, in that Province.

OBITUARY.—It is with sincere sorrow we announce the death of our contemporary, Mr CHRISTOPHER SMILER, late Editor and Publisher of the Temperance Telegraph. He died at his residence in St John, on Sunday morning last, of disease of the heart. He was in the 35th year of his age, and unmarried. By his death the Temperance cause has lost a sincere and active partizan, as well as an attached friend, whose place in its ranks it will be no easy matter to supply.
