The fire extended much faster and farther up the main street, from the place where it broke out, than it did downwards, only three houses below Dawson's, on the front street, being destroyed. Its further ravages in this direction were ehecked by the extraordinary efforts to save a fine new ship of some 1,500 tons, belonging to Messrs. J. & R. Reed, which was on the stocks in the shipyard adjoining, and to the preservation of which, the efforts of several of the fire companies were mainly directed for

when the range of high houses at the upper end of Main street caught fire, the heat grew so intense, that the street was impassible. The houses on the opposite side were all blistered and scorched, and the windows all cracked, and either to recognize or repudiate the acts of his officers at Canton. A large and very substantial looking brick building, belonging to Mr Morrison, being placed between two fires in front and rear also took fire, five or six of the window frames blazing up simultaneously, and was completely

It was near 0 o'clock in the morning, when the fire, as if it had expended its fury, gradually died out, the last house destroyed being a valuable one of Mr Allingham's, near the Methodist chapel. This burned very slowly. Morning Freeman.

Serious Riot .- After we left the Flats yester day, we understood that aserious riot occurred, growing out of those villanous feuds which one would really think in a new country might be allowed to die and be decently buried. York Point has a feud with Portland and the Marsh Road, and the least occasion offers an opportunity for the display of violence. Yesterday it seems a boy on the race course gave offence to a York Pointer, who beat him, and this was the signal for a general melee between the Marsh the signal for a general melee between the Marsh road people and the people of York Point. The figiting lasted some time, each party getting the advantage by turns. Captain Scoular, as soon as he was aware of the affray, sent a small party of his force to keep the peace. On their arrival they found three men lying on the flats unable to move away, quive to the severe best unable to move away, owing to the severe beating that they had received. These they removed, and we are not aware of any serious riot happening afterwards in that neighbour-

In the afternoon there were several fights about York Point, and one man, we are told, had his nose bitten off. Another man was set upon at York Point for no other reason than that he was a Marsh Road man, and if he had not fled into a shop would have been badly beaten. It was rumoured that more than one man had been killed on the Flats, but up to a late hour ast evening we were unable to gain authority for the rumor

for the rumor.

The neighbourhood of York Point, last evening, was in a very excited state, and threats of vengeance on the Marsh Road people were freely uttered, and it is the general opinion that, unless some measures are taken to secure the peace, a serious affray may take place to-day.—The Flats are not in the jurisdiction of the City Magistrate, and it would seem really worth the attention of the authorities whether it would not be well to obtain the assistance of would not be well to obtain the assistance of the military.

The Circus, which was pitched a tew days ago, was obliged to decamp suddenly, owing to the threats of the York Point Rowdies, and the races are likely to be put a stop to by the same desperate ruffians. Whatever we may think of either of these amusements they are both lawful; and in the pursuit of lawful pleasure the general public should be protected from gangs of reckless villains, whose hardened carcasses seem to receive fresh toughness from beating. If the city is to be given up to these rowdies the sooner it is known the better, so that strangers may avoid it, as they do New Orleans in a fever time. These faction fighters ought to be made to understand that their fighting here will put them into the Peniten-tiary.—Leader.
