Rules and Regulations against Coasting.

At a General Session of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, held at the Court House in Newcastle, in and for the County of Northumberland, on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of January, in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and fifty seven.

ORDERED, That the following Rules and Regulations be made and established, in pursuance of the authority vested in the General Sessions by Act of Assembly, 18 Vict., Cap. 23, Sec. 2. "To prevent coasting on the streets and highways."

1. That no person of whatever age or description shall coast or ride for amusement, on any sled or sledge, down any of the hills, in any street, lane, alley, highway, or public squares within the towns of Newcastle or Chatham respectively, under the penalty of ten shillings for each and every offence, and it is hereby declared to be the duty of any of either of the constables of the said towns, respectively, to take notice of and make complaint against any person or persons so offending.

11. That if any such offender be a minor, apprentice, or servant, the parent, guardian, or master of such offender, shall be liable for the payment of the penalty.

Rules and Regulations, &c.—Tank.

At a General Session of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, held at the Court House in Newcastle, in and for the County of Northumberland, on Tuesday the thirteenth day of January, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty seven.

ORDERED, That the following Rules and Regulations be made and established in pursuance of the authority vested in the General Sessions by the Revised Statutes, Chap. 61.

"For abating and removing all public nuisances."

I. That whoever shall cast or throw any thing whatever into the public Tank, in Newcastle, thereby rendering the water impure, unwholesome, or unfit for use, shall be guilty of a nuisance, and shall be subject to a penalty of two pounds.

11. Whoever shall in any way interfere with the Fountain which supplies the Tank, by adulterating or otherwise injuring or rendering the water impure or unwholesome, shall be subject to a like penalty of two pounds.

111. That in the event of any person whatever encumbering or occupying the said Fountain or Tank with any description of material, to the injury or nuisance of the water, it shall be lawful for any inhabitant to abate or remove the nuisance from the said premises to a convenient distance, without being subject to damage or loss, by reason of so doing.

Rules and Regulations against Firing Guns, &c.

At a General Session of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, held at the Court House in Newcastle, in and for the County of Northumberland, on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of January, in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty seven.

ORDERED, That the following Rules and Regulations be made and established in pursuance of the authority vested in the General Sessions by Act of Assembly, 18 Vict., Cap. 23, Sec. 2.

"To prevent the Firing of Guns or other fire-arms, or letting off Squibs or other fireworks, or burning of combustible material, the carrying of fire, lighted candles or lamps, without being covered or secured."

I. That it shall not be lawful for any person to fire or discharge any gun, fowling-piece, pistol, or other fire-arms, (except in the discharge of some military duty or exercise required by law), or to set off any cracker, squib, or other fireworks, in or upon any of the streets, lanes, squares, or wharves, of the towns of Newcastle and Chatham, respectively, under a penalty of one pound for each and every offence.

11. Whoever shall collect together any combustible materials, on any of the streets, lanes, squares or wharves, within the towns aforesaid, and set fire to the same, or shall aid and assist in so doing, or shall countenance such, or luter about such burning, appearing to aid, countenance, or assist in the same, each and every person so offending shall for each and every offence forfeit a fine of one pound.

111. Whoever shall carry through any of the streets, lanes, squares, or on any of the wharves, or into any building or out house, any fire or lighted candle or lamp, without the same being covered or secured so as to prevent the sparks from flying, or the flames from igniting, shall, for each and every offence, forfeit a fine of one pound.

11. The Parents of Minors, and the Masters of Apprentices, who shall transgress the foregoing Regulations, or any, or either of them, shall be liable for the penalty therefor.

V. It shall be the special duty of all and every constable, residing in those the said Towns, knowing of any offence against the foregoing Regulations, to take notice of and make complaint against any person or persons offending.
