He opposed Responsible Government till opposition proved useless—and we very well know, had the introduction of constitutional government into this Province depended on the vote of Mr Street, we would be without it until this hour. He has always been opposed to the reduction of Salaries. They were never carried through the House in-They were never carried through the House intact, but they earned for him the reputation of a "political bungler."
