

They arrived here on Saturday last, and on Wednesday, the mate and part of the crew started for Gaspe, to take on board Lloyd's Agent to survey the wreck.

The Royal Sovereign, after two schooner loads of deals having been taken out of her, was floated off, and towed up to Chatham by the steamer Lady Le Marchant, on Thursday last. A survey was held on her yesterday, but we have not heard the decision.

WRECK.—We are indebted to the Cape Breton News of the 4th instant, for the following account of the wreck of a vessel bound to London from Richibucto.

"Captain Nutt, wife and child, and the crew of the Barque Peace, from Richibucto, bound to London, laden with deals, and burnt off Cape North on Thursday last, arrived here last night in a destitute condition, having lost everything. Mrs Nutt and child, escaped from the cabin when on fire, in their night clothes, and in that state were ten hours in a small boat, until they arrived at Neil's Harbour."

CALIFORNIA.

New York, Nov. 4.—The Star of the West brings \$1,464,000 in specie. Her news is six days later than that by the Quaker City.

The rainy season had commenced in California. Col. Fremont had purchased the Mercer and Mariposa Canal.

Other murders have been committed by the Washo Indians, and the citizens are arming for defence.

Dates from Banana are of the 19th. An earthquake was felt there on the 15th, and also at Loja and Quito. At the former place numerous houses and churches were destroyed.

Political affairs in Peru are unchanged. Don Raphael E. Calante has been elected Governor of Costa Rica.

Aspinwall, Oct. 20.—The government of Costa Rica and Nicaragua are raising every force possible. Col. Canby, of the Costa Rica army, was blockading the river San Juan, at Castillo, for the purpose of taking that fort. His reason for so doing as posted at Greytown, was, that there is at present no recognised government at Nicaragua, he wishes to occupy the above fort, so as to prevent any further invasion of the filibusters. The river boats are all above San Darios.

CANADA.

The Canadian papers state that lumber, the great staple of Lower Canada, has been falling in price since August, and the sale is very dull although 600,000 tons of shipping have reached Quebec this year against 470,000 last year.
