rider to the Government Bill. A lengthy discussion followed, in which much warmth of feeling was exhibited. Members of Govern-ment charged opposition with delaying business of the Country. Johnson, Gilmore, Con-nell, Sutton, and others, charged Government with giving factious opposition to a bill the principles of which they acknowledged to be

Several members advocated an immediate appeal to the People, as the only remedy for the present state of things. The Rider was finally rejected by a vote of 17 to 18, there being absent 3 of opposition, and 2 of Government supporters, and Speaker in chair, (Supposed to mean that bill was rejected as a Rider, but carried as a bill. House then resolved itself into Committee of whole, and passed Smith's Bill without a division. The House next went into consideration of the answer to address moved by C. Perley, respecting appointments to the Legislative Council. Perley moved following; resolved that in the opinion of this Committee, the information given by Government in reply to the address relative to appointments to Legislative Council is not satisfactory to this house. A long discussion followed, Progres reported.

March 24.

Amendments made by Legislative Council on bill relating to office of Register of Deeds and Wills were not agreed to by the Lower House, bill consequently lost. Wilmot introduced a bill to continue Parish Scool act stationed to the latest that in case a disclusion. ting at same time, that in case a dissolution should occur, it was necessary to make provi-sion, whereby school teachers could receive their pay. Provisional Secretary charged oppo-sition with determination to obstruct busi-ness; Johnson retorted, denying the charge, and another war followed. Attorney General charged the opposition with being an oligar-chy: Harding warmly replied, calling the Ho-vernment an oligarchy, and stating that Government an ongareny, and stating that Go-vernment had not the confidence of the coun-try. Debate kept up with spirit until adjourn-ment for dinner. Opposition defended by Smith, Gilmour, Johnson, Harding, and others, Both sides seemed to agree that dissolution was the only remedy for the present state of the only remedy for the present state of things. Speaker declared that the whole debate was irregular. The bill to revive the Parish School Act having received a third reading; the Provincial Secretary moved that the House go into committee of whole in consideration of the bill—several members opposed on the ground that the Government promised new measures in speeches. McMonagle declared himself opposed to the revival of the old School himself opposed to the revival of the old School Law, and expressed opinion that Government should now resign. Wilmot said he would not have introduced the bill, but for the speech of Johnson last evening. Motion finally withdrawn. Progress reported on bill relating to Court House in County of York. McMonagle introduced a bill to authorize division of King's County. House adjourned at a quarter past 5.

On motion of Smith, resolved, that address be presented to His Excellency, praying for de-tailed statement of Cost of Public Printing since the 1st January, 1854. Scovil presented peti-tions from some of the inhabitants of King's E. Perley asked the following of Chief Commis-sioner; does the Chief Commissioner intend to make report upon exploration of road through Douglas Valley. Have Government determi-ned upon site for contemplated new Bridge over Oromucto river, or is it the intention of Government to alter the present site of Bridge. Reported as agreed to by House. Bill relating to incorporation of North Shore Steamboat Company. Bill relating to act establishing Board of health in city of St. John. Bill rela-ting to Lower Flat of new Court House, Fredericton. After a long discussion, progress reported on bill relating to disposal of Lumber on Crown Lands. Further progress reported on bill relating to Hignways. Solicitor General brought in a bill to amend a law relating to imprisonment for debt. House adjourned a quarter to six o'clock.

March 26. Immediately after reading of Journals, the Hon. Mr Gray informed House that the Execu-tive Council had unanimously agreed in recommendation to Governor to prorogue House with view of dissolution. Mr Smith arose, and after speech of some length in reference to position of Government, moved the following resolution-Whereas, members of Executive Council have declared their inability to carry on the of country, therefor it is the opinion of this House, they should immediately resign. Street spoke an hour in op-position to resolution. Lawrence followed on the same side, speaking upwards of an hour, when House refused to hear him any longer. Scene of great confusion and disorder followed. Lawrence persisted in taking the floor. Sutten, Johnson, and others maintained he should how to decision of the House. Standing order moved. Great excitement; Serjeant at Arms first unable to clear the galleries. Smith arose to speak, and was interrupted from gallery.— Smith with much warmth, declared he was not going to be brow-beaten by a Fredericton mob, and that it was high time to remove the seat of Government. Galleries finally cleared, but considerable excitement outside. Lawrence considerable excitement outside. Lawrence persisted in keeping the floor; great confusion prevailed. McMonagle finally obtained floor, denounced Government as imbecile and incompetent, and entitled no longer to the confidence

of the House.

Proceedings so summary, no opportunity to try question on Smith's resolution; 21 mem-bers remained in their seats during prorogation and but 29 proceeded to Council Chamber, considerable excitement outside. All was quiet at 2 o'clock. The following is His Excellency's Speech in proroguing the Legislature.

Mr President, and Gentlemen of the Legisla-

I have readily given my assent to the hills which you have passed. On full consideration on state of public affairs, I have come to the determination of Prorogueing this Assembly, with view to its immediate dissolution, I entertain hopes that the progress of Public business will be facilitated by authority of a new Assembly.
