LATEST BY TELEGRAPH.

Halifax, July 15, 1857.

America arrived 1 P. M. Left Liverpool July 4.

Great Britain.—Parliamentary proceedings very dull and uninteresting. The Bill for redemption of Danish Sound Dues been passed to 2nd reading by House of Lords.

Latest.—On Friday in the House of Lords, Ellenboro called attention to reduction in rate of Exchange with England, recently made by East India Company by lowering their terms for Bills on England with object of preventing export of silver.

Earl Granville said every precaution would be taken against any unnecessary design on the resources of the Indian Government had however, at present large balances at its disposal, and there was no reason to fear that it would be unable to meet all its engagements.

France.—Cavignac is officially announced as one of the opposition candidates for Paris. The Government candidates are the same.

The Paris Correspondent of Daily News says it is currently reported at Lille that in consequence of excellent prospects of harvest the Belgian Government has resolved to take off the Export duty now levied at French frontier upon cereals coming from Belgium.

The Paris Correspondent of Times writes.—"The conspiracy of a certain number of Italians against life of Emperor seems to be marked by a more serious character than was originally supposed.

Naples.—The Globes' Paris Correspondent Telegraphs:—Turin, Thursday.—The Steamer Cagliari bound from Genoa for Tunis was seized with a band of armed Italian insurgents, who landed on Neapolitan island of Ponsea and liberated some prisoners.

A late despatch says:—The political prisoners liberated on Island of Ponsea numbered about 300 and in conjunction with insurgents they attacked the Neapolitan Gende Armerie but were repulsed, several were arrested, remainder fled.

Prussia.—Berlin Correspondence affirms positively that the Danish note in regard to the pending difficulty had certainly been received at that capital and that its contents although courteous were of a negative character already anticipated.

The Belgians appears to have made a tour in Principalities and there commenced an agitation in favor of union; assuring people that European powers were agreed upon its expediency and were meditating the establishment of Monarchy under a Belgian Prince.

Persia.—Mohammora was entirely abandoned by British on 16th May, and Sir James Outram had arrived at Bagdad.

China.—A letter from Hong Kong states Lord Elgin and Baron Gross were to have interview at Singapore with Sir Jon Bowring and M. DeBourblion, the French Minister, and that no important importations would be undertaken until after this meeting.

The Courier de Paris throws doubt on the rumour that England in consequence of the rebellion in India had asked France to send more troops to China.
