## COUNTY RESTIGOUCHE.

OUR Correspondent at Dalhousie, under date of June 11, furnishes the following:

**INQUEST.**—On Monday last an Inquest was held by H. Montgomery, Esq., Coroner, on the body of Owen Williams, 24 years of age, a native of Wales. Deceased was a seaman, belonging to the ship *Caledonia*, of Liverpool. From the evidence, it appeared that the young man had been walking along one of the beams, from which he fell into the hold, a distance of ten feet, striking upon timber.

**Verdict.**—Died from concussion of the brain, the consequence of the fall.

"He lived two hours after the accident, but showed scarcely any consciousness during that time."

## THE NEW MINISTRY.

WE are sadly in the dark respecting the formation of the new Cabinet. Rumour has it that Messrs. Fisher, Tilley, Brown, Johnson, Smith and Waters, have been sworn in as Executive Councillors; and that Mr Fisher is to act as Attorney General and Mr Tilley as Provincial Secretary. Report states that the Legislature will be called together on the 24th instant. We trust the *Fredericton Gazette*, due to-day, will enable us to furnish our readers with something official on these important subjects.

## LOCAL.

**A WORD OR TWO WITH THE THUNDERER OF THE TIMES.**—This wise and astute political writer, has thought fit this week to devote one article and part of another, to the castigation of the *Tory Gleaner*, as he in the plenitude of his Political wisdom, has discovered us to be. We presume that the getting up and discharging of these thunderbolts, took such an amount of mental and bodily labour, that extra time was required, which accounts for that Star of the North not making its appearance until Friday, some twenty hours after its usual publishing day; and we have not the least doubt if the Man Mountain of the Times produces another such mouse, he will, if he does not burst during the operation, take a couple of extra days to it, for it requires him more than a week to furnish such astounding articles as he has favoured us with in the last Times. We would like to know from the learned Editor, who are the parties we "have named to certain offices," that will feel a greater degree of disappointment if such offices be not granted them, than they otherwise would feel if not named in connection with them. Now we will, for the information of the Editor of the Times, say, that in our programme of last week, we took into consideration the rights of the Northern Section of the Province, and considered that it was entitled to two seats at the Council Board, and named two Liberals, Messrs. Johnson and Sutton to offices, which we thought them qualified to fill. The North, by right, we consider entitled to two seats in that body to look after our interests. With respect to the butting up of Mr Johnson, will the Editor of the Times inform us how long it is since he has changed his mind with respect to that gentleman. We recollect, and that not many months ago, hearing him threaten that gentleman with thunder from his press, that would annihilate him.

We should like to be informed the time he discovered we were a *Tory Journal*, for not many months since he wrote to the Surveyor General of the Province denouncing the *Gleaner* as a *LIBERAL* paper; that it was doing all it could to destroy the then existing Government, and as he was *NEUTRAL*, he considered we should be deprived of the patronage of publishing the *Crown Land Sales*, &c., and that it should be transferred to him. So much for consistency. This is the man who has a horror of being charged with *ESCHewing* politics, and who is con-

stantly pointing out the improprieties of the *Gleaner*. Do man, mend your own glaring inconsistency before you find fault with your neighbour.

In conclusion we would merely remark, that if the Editor of the *Colonial Times* would devote the time he employs weekly in penning paragraphs to injure the reputation of the *Gleaner* to setting up type in his office, it would be far more honest than occupying his paper with 25 Advertisements of his own, varying from a column to five lines; and what is still worse, taking column after column of advertisements and pieces of news that have been printed on one page and inserting them again on the other.

She is a noble looking craft, and we have no doubt will sustain the high character of the vessels built in this yard.

**CHURCH NEWS.**—At an Ordination held on Trinity Sunday last, in Christ Church Cathedral, at Fredericton, by the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, the Rev. Chas. F. Street, B. A., Curate of Nelson and Blackville, was duly ordained Priest; and Mr William Cruden, B. A., Trinity College, Toronto, was admitted to the Holy Order of a Deacon.
