After the reading of the journals, some miscellaneous business was transacted. Mr Cudlip presented petitions from Corporation of the City of St. John, accompanied with the following Bills which were read a 2nd time: — Bill to authorize increased assessment for better sup-port of the Fire Department of the City of St. John; Bill to provide for appointment of Deputy Harbor Master; Bill relating to Public Debt of the City of St. John; Bill to enlarge jurisdiction of Court, St. John; Bill to amend Ast to authorize the opening of Canterbury St. and several other Bills. Bill emanating from the Chamber of Commerce, relative to eation of Usury Laws, read 1st time. Mr Tib-bits presented a petition from some inhabitants of Gloucester, protesting against the return of Mr Bnd, on grounds of no qualification, Mr McLellan introduced Bill to aid the law relating to the Post Office, by making the Post-

master-General a non-political office the same as formerly.

Several Bills received 3rd reading in the House this morning . Some discussion relative to travelling expenses of members of the House, the regulation of which was left for His Honor the Speaker. Lengthy and important debate took place upon the Resolution moved by Mr Gilmour relative to Railways; states that owing to the depressed state of the finances of the Province, it is the opinion of the House that the extensions from Fredericton to Woodstock, and from Shediac to Miramichi should not be proceeded with. (No time specified.) Debate took very wide range, and there was much diversity of opinion among members in reference to the Railway. Mr Kerr thought the Resolution entirely unnecessary, and moved that it be not now put, this was lost by vote 18 to 9. Messrs. Tibbets, Gilbert, and some other members expressed themselves in favor of stopping all the Railway works at present. Mr Steadman was for carrying out the present scheme. Messrs. Mintosh and Chandler believed that the Line from St. John to Shediac would never pay. Debate lasted till near 1 o'clock. Resolution passed by vote of 20 to 13. A Resolution to expend the amount appropriated for clearing out the mouth of the Miramichi River, was supported by the members for Northumberland, and carried by a large majority. It is expected that the House will be prorogued to-morrow. House adjourned at 6 o'clock.
