Prussia.—Dismissal of the Prussian Ministry.—The following members of a new Prussian Ministry have been appointed:—

Prince Hohenzollern, President of the Council.
M. Schleinitz, Foreign Affairs.
M. Bethman-Hollweg, Public Instruction.
General Bonin, War.

The rest of the present ministers are to be dismissed as soon as the arrangements for supplying their places are completed.

INDIA.

The following telegram from Malta has been received at the Foreign Office.

ALEXANDRIA, Oct. 25, 1858.

The steamer Ganges arrived at Suez from Bombay yesterday. Dates—Bombay, Oct. 10; Aden, Oct. 18.

Tantia Topee having for a few days after his former defeat occupied Sironje, fled on the approach of the detachments under Gen. Michel and Brigadier Smith, and is now marching in the direction of Chaudree.

Several gallant affairs have taken place in various parts of Oude, all ending in the total rout and great destruction of the enemy, with trifling loss on our side.

The campaign has not yet commenced, but Lord Clyde has left Allahabad for Cawnpore, en route for Lucknow. Meanwhile, the rebels, it is stated, are still in great numbers, and are ravaging the country, and sorely oppressing the inhabitants wherever our troops are not posted.

The steamer Pottinger was to leave Bombay for Suez on the 12th inst., for troops.

The following message, also from Malta, has been received at the East India House:—

Central India.—The advanced force under Captain Mayne, consisting of 420 sabres of the Malwa Field Force, reached Sironje on the 30th September, but found that the enemy under Tantia Topee had broken up his camp, and retreated towards Esanghur. This place the rebels attacked and captured on the 2nd of October.

Brigadier Smith, with his force from Goonah, reached Esanghur on the morning of the 5th of October. The enemy, with his guns and elephants, had the same morning, at sunrise, left the place for Chundaree. Brigadier Smith's cavalry, however, succeeded in capturing four guns.

Eight hundred Sowars had been dispatched by the rebel leaders to Plunder Ranade, (qy.)

A combined movement is proposed for hemming the enemy in at Chundaree by the Mhow Field Force—the force under Brigadier Smith, and the troops at Goond, Saugor, and Oojein.

Major-Gen. Mitchell has been placed in command of the troops serving in Rajpootana and Central India.

With the exception of a slight bheel disturbance in Khandeish, the Bombay Presidency is quiet.

Her Majesty's 46th Regiment, and the left wing of her Majesty's 91st have arrived in Bombay from Suez. The former has gone to Scinde.

UNITED STATES.

From Utah.—St. Louis, Nov. 15.—Mr Brown, the Utah correspondent of the New York Tribune has arrived here, he left Salt Lake on the 16th ult.

The snow on the mountains was about three feet deep, and the ice three inches thick.—Several trains will be unable to pass through them.

Considerable excitement existed at Salt Lake City, in reference to the reports of gold at Pike's Peak, and numbers were leaving for the diggings.

Fire at Providence.—Nov. 16.—The theatre was entirely destroyed by the fire last night.—The wall fell on a low wooden building on the east, and crushed it. The total loss is estimated at over \$200,000. Insured for \$191,400.

MEXICO.

New Orleans, Nov. 12.—The steamship Tennessee has arrived here, with Vera Cruz dates of the 9th inst. Guadalupe was recaptured by the Liberals on the 28th, instead of the 18th ult. It was most desperately defended, and the Liberals had to be reinforced by 1000 men. The people were rejoicing at their success.

Zuloaga was anxious to retire from the field, but the clergy had offered him another million. Mazatlan was in possession of the Liberals.—San Blas was the only town on the Pacific held by Zuloaga.

The steamer Guerrero had been recaptured in the Tobasco river by the Liberals, and the Spanish steamer Colon, at Sahuos, had been taken by Alvarez.

Monday, Nov. 15.—The steamship Gen. Rusk has arrived here with Indianola dates of the 12th inst. Rumors were current that the city of Mexico has been attacked by the Liberals, and four hundred of Zuloaga's soldiers killed; and also that the whole country was in possession of the Liberals with the exception of the Capital.

NOVA SCOTIA.

The contract for erecting a building on the site of the old St. Matthew's Church, has been awarded by Messrs. Doull & Miller, of this city, to Mr Robert Malcom, Builder, for the sum of £4,040. There were three competitors for the work, and the difference between their respective tenders scarcely exceeded £50. The building is to be of free stone, four stories in height, and rather highly ornamented.

The sleighing of the past three days proved quite a harvest for the cabmen.—*Halifax Journal.*

NEW BRUNSWICK.

Fire.—On Sunday morning, about 3 o'clock, a fire broke out in Indian Town, by which three dwelling houses, a barn, and a number of woodsheds were destroyed. We understand the barn in which the fire originated, belonged to Mr Hugh Morris, in which a fine horse, waggon, sleigh and harness were also consumed. Two of the dwelling houses, owned by Mrs Curren, were insured, the other belonged to Mr D. Belyea, and was not insured. No. 1 and 2 Portland fire engines were quickly on the ground, and by their exertions the fire was speedily put out.—*St. John Globe.*

YESTERDAY'S MAIL.

By the papers received by the mail yesterday, we select the following miscellaneous items.

NOVA SCOTIA.—The Rev. Caswell Drake, of North Carolina, has sailed for Europe, to establish his claim as a descendant and heir to the famous Sir Francis Drake, the great admiral and navigator. Mr Drake expects to succeed in making good his claim to the immense property belonging to the Drake estate, which now, like the Jennings estate, is in want of an heir.—*Halifax Mng. Sun.*

The Fishery Commission.—Hon. Benj. Wiggin, of Bangor, U. S. Commissioner for the Fisheries, under the Reciprocity Treaty, and R. D. Cutts, Esq., of Washington, Surveyor to the American Commission, are now in New York. M. H. Perley, Esq., H. M. Commissioner, and G. H. Perley, Esq., his surveyor, are also in that city.

Burns' centenary will positively be observed by the Scottish Societies in this city.

Charles F. Allison, Esq., of Sackville, N. B., a staunch friend of the Wesleyan denomination in the Lower Provinces, and the liberal supporter of the Institution of learning which bears his name in New Brunswick, died of erysipelas on Saturday last.

Upwards of 7000 barrels of Flour arrived at this port yesterday.—*Halifax Journal.*

UNITED STATES.—*Thirtieth Street Tragedy, New York.*—We are happy to be able to state that the bloody affair in the house of Gouldy family in New York, will not turn out so fatal as was at first anticipated. One of the servant girls, Elizabeth Carr, is reported to have died in the hospital, and Mr Gouldy is still considered in a critical state. The remainder of the family are now in a fair way of recovering from their wounds.

The United States Government expenditures are at the rate of \$2,000,000 per week, while the receipts do not exceed \$700,000. Another loan of \$20,000,000 is already talked of as soon as Congress assembles in December. The indications are that Mr Buchanan will go out of office leaving behind him a debt of at least a hundred millions of dollars.—*Halifax Sun.*

The Hudson Frozen.—On Friday morning last the Hudson was skimmed over with ice, 5 miles above Poughkeepsie.
