

diately on Miranda's taking possession of Coro, marched all the troops, militia, &c. that they could muster both from Laguiria and from Carracas, and put all the mules of the country in requisition for the expedition. They keep the most vigilant watch over every one. They have been extremely jealous of the Americans, and gave orders that only one person from each American vessel should come on shore during their stay in the country.

"Lieut. Boyd, (mentioned in the enclosed paper) was strongly of opinion, that Miranda would eventually succeed; and from his statement to me, as well as from every appearance it is certain that the English are assisting him with good will."

The Marquis Yrujo yesterday took passage on board the Frenchtown packet for Philadelphia.—The circumstance of his not progressing to the seat of government, and the observations copied from the Aurora into the American of to-day, seem to declare that the tenor of the late paragraph was incorrect, which clothed him with new powers, calculated to offer insult to our government.

Military Inspection.

Saturday last, being the day appointed for the Inspection of the different Militia Companies of this District, it is with pleasure we notice their improved state both in discipline and equipment. The Companies performed a variety of manœuvres in a superior style, and gave general satisfaction to a numerous concourse of spectators.

From the minutes of the Methodist Episcopal Church in the United States, which have been published, it appears that in the year 1775, the members consisted of only 1160 persons; in the year 1780, the society had increased to 8504; in four years thereafter, they were 14,988; in 1791, the members amounted to 76,143; in 1802, to 86,734; in 1803 they had increased 17,336; in 1804 they had a further increase of 9,664; in 1805 nearly 7000 were added; and in 1806 the society consists of not less than 136,570 persons.

DIED] On Sunday last, at his house at Oak Park, the Hon. ISAAC ALLEN, a Member of His Majesty's Council, and one of the Judges of the Supreme Court of this Province—a death which will be long and deeply lamented both as a private and a public loss.

A paralytic stroke, in the month of Nov. 1804, had given a violent shock to his constitution, from which, however, though his limbs continued very feeble, his mind received no permanent injury; and he soon recovered a comfortable share of health which with few interruptions, he continued to enjoy till Friday the 3d inst. when he suffered another similar attack. From this also he recovered so far as to be able, on the Monday following, to take an airing on horseback; but on the evening of that day another relapse left him in a situation evidently hopeless. Yet he soon recovered his senses, and, for some hours on Wednesday, was able to speak intelligibly; but from this time his speech entirely failed. He still continued perfectly sensible, and awake to the attentions of his friends. He had yet

the use of one hand, which he held out to every one that approached his bed side, giving at the same time a complacent look, clearly expressive of a sense of his condition, tempered with resignation to the will of Heaven. Having thus lingered till Sunday, near 2 o'clock in the afternoon, he expired without a groan.

On Tuesday morning his remains were brought in the Garrison Barge to Fredericton; conveyed from the landing to the Province Hall, and laid on the table within the Bar of the Supreme Court, while the preparations were made for the Funeral Procession, of which the order is subjoined. As the deceased had served, with distinguished reputation, in a military capacity during the American War, military honors made a part of the Funeral solemnity. This mark of merited respect was paid, in a manner highly impressive, by the New-Brunswick Regiment, of which the Martial appearance and discipline are such as would do honor to any Corps in his Majesty's Service.

Mr. RYAN,

In order that no person may in future plead ignorance of the following Act and Regulations—You are hereby requested to publish the same in the FREDERICTON TELEGRAPH.

AN ACT to authorize the Justices of the Sessions in several Counties of this Province to make regulations for the weighing of HAY within such Counties where it may be found necessary to erect machines for that purpose. Passed the 8th February, 1799.

I. BE it enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor, Council and Assembly, that from and after the passing of this Act, the Justices of the General Sessions of the Peace for the several Counties in this Province, except the County of St. John, be, and hereby are authorized and empowered, if they think fit, to erect, or give permission for erecting Machines

for the weighing of Hay in such Town or Parish as they from time to time shall think necessary, and to make and ordain such rules and regulations, and establish such rates and allowances to the owners and proprietors of the said Hay Machines in their respective Counties as they may judge necessary for the better government and management of the same; and that the said Justices shall and may affix such penalties not exceeding Ten Pounds, as they may think necessary for the carrying into execution such rules and regulations, and for the establishing such rates and allowances to by them to be made and established; such penalties to be recovered on the oath of one or more credible witnesses or witnesses, before any two of his Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County where the penalty shall be incurred, and to be levied by warrant of distress and sale of the offender's goods, one half to the informer, and the other half to the use of the Poor of the Town or Parish where the offence shall be committed.

REGULATIONS.

At a Court of General Sessions of the Peace held at Fredericton, in and for the County of York, the 15th day of June, 1804.

PURSUANT to a Law of this Province passed in the 39th year of his Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to authorize the Justices of the Sessions in several Counties of this Province to make regulations for the weighing of Hay within such Counties where it may be found necessary to erect machines for that purpose."

PERMISSION is given to Mr. EDWARD WINSLOW MILLER to erect a Machine in Fredericton, for the purpose of weighing of Hay—And he is authorized and empowered to demand and receive from the owner or feller of such Hay at the rate of Two Pence per Hundred for all Loads of Fifteen Hundred weight and under, and at the rate of One penny half-penny per Hundred for all Loads exceeding Fifteen Hundred, that may be sold in Fredericton, between the bridge at Dr. EARLE's and Phillis's Creek, which shall be weighed at the said Machine, and a Ticket shall be produced expressive of the exact weight thereof, signed by the weigher, and if any person or persons shall presume to sell or purchase any Load or Loads of Hay without such Ticket so to be obtained, or shall in any manner contravene these regulations, he shall for each and every offence forfeit and pay the sum of Twenty Shillings to be recovered and applied as by Law directed. And the Court further ordain that this regulation shall continue and be in full force for Fourteen Years and no longer.—And the Court further ordain that the said EDWARD WINSLOW MILLER do give Bond to the Treasurer of the County in the penal sum of Fifty Pounds for the due performance of this order, and that he also be bound to give the necessary attendance between the hours of Sunrising and Sunsetting, to carry the same into effect.

And I further give Notice, that, if after the day of the date hereof, any person or persons shall presume to sell or purchase any Load or Loads of Hay without weighing, contrary to the true intent and meaning of the said Act and Regulations, they shall be prosecuted as the law directs.
