ANACT to authorife the Juff ces of the Seffions, in feveral Counties of this Province to make re gulations for the weighing of HAY within fuch Counties where it may be found net flary to e reft machines for that purpole. Paffed the 8 h February, 1799.

I. BE it enacted by the Lieutenant Governor. Council and Allembly, that from and after the palfing of this Act, the Juffices of the General Selfiens of the Peace for the feveral Counties in this Province, except the County of St. John, be, and hereby are authorifed and empowered, if they think fit, to cree, or give permifion for creeting Machine. for the weighing of Hay in luch Town or Parish as they from time to time fhall think neceffiry, and to make and ordain luch rules and regulations, and eltablilh luch rates and allowances to the owners and proprietors of the faid Hay Machines in the r respective Councies as they may judge nece flary for the beiter government and management of the fame ; and that the laid Juff ces shall and may affix such penalties not exceeding Ten Pounds, as they may think neverfary for the carrying into execu ion tuch rules and regulations; and for the effabiliting fuch rices and allowances to by them to be made and this ished; such penal ies to be recovered on the outh of one or more credible wirnels or wirneffes, before any two of his Majefty's Juffices of the Place for the County where the penalty shall be incuried, and to be levied by warrant of diffrets and lale of the off nder's goods, one half to the informer, and the other half to the ule of the Poor of the Lown or Perich where the offence that be committed.

REGULATIONS.

At a Court of General Seffions of the Peace held at Fredericton, in and for the County of York; he 15 h day of June; 1804.

PURSUANT to a Law of this Province paffed in the 39th year of his Majefty's Reign, invitled, " An A& to author fe the Juffices of the Seffions " in feveral Counties of this Province to make " regulations for the weighing of Hay within " fuch Counties where is may be found necessa-" ry to creet machines for that purpole." PERMISSION is given to MI. EDWARD WIN-SLOW MILLER 10 creet a Machine in Frederict in, for the purpole of weighing of Hay-And he is authorised and empowered to demand and receive from the owner or teller of fuch Hay at the rate of Two Pence per Hundred for all Loads of Fifteen Hundred weight and under, and at the rate of One penny half penny per Hundred for all Loads exceeding Fificen Hundred, that may be fold in Fre denction, between the bridge at Dr. EARLE's and Phillis's Creek, which shall be weighed at the faid Machine, and a Ticket thall be produced expressive of the ex & weight thereof, figned by the weigher, and if any perion or perions shall prefume to fellor purchase any Lord or Loads of Hay without such l'icket to to be obtained, or shall in any manner contravene these regulations, he shall for each and every offence forfent and pay the lum of Twenty Shillings to be recovered and applied as by Law directed. And the Court further ordain that this regulation shall continue and be in full force for Fourteen Years and no longer .- And the Court ur he ordain that the faid EDWARD WINSLOW VILLER do give Bond to the Treasurer of the County in the penal fum of Fifty Pounds for the lue performance of this order, and that he alto be yound to give the neceffary attendance between the hours of Sunrifing and Sunletting, to carry the ame into eff. a.
