REVOLUTION IN HAYTI.

There are two accounts in circulation of the late chance of tyrants in the black island of Hayti;—Both of which however agree, that the fable Emperor DESSALINES, has been assassinated, and his dynasty at an end.

One account states that a body of French from St. Domingo (city) had advanced and defeated the mulatto Gen. CAPEAU near Monti Christi. That DESSALINES set out to succour the defeated General, met him, and attributing his misfortune to treachery, ordered him to be shot:—That DESSALINES then set out for Port-de-Paix giving orders, it was said, to put all the mulattoes to death. While on his way to his palace, his troops mutined; and demanded pay and clothing:—He offered them 4 dollars each, which being refused, he left them:—Soon afterwards he received a letter from Gen. BRAAVE, that the troops were rising in rebellion; and DESSALINES ordered all who refused to return to duty, to be shot.—BRAAVE returned an answer, which irritated the Emperor, and he set out immediately for the camp; where martial music being played, which he thought was a demonstration of joy at his return, he left his car-

riage, and mounted on horseback.—

When in front of the line BRAAVE rode up to him, and desired him to dismount; to which he sternly replied, “You do not know me, Sir.” The answer was, “Yes, I do, too well.”—On which DESSALINES drew his pistols, and fired but missing him he jumped off his horse, fled into a cane patch, where being followed by his ferocious troops, he was immediately bayoneted. CHRISTOPHE was then proclaimed Governor-General, and tranquillity was restored.

HALIFAX, January 2.

The master of the Sch'r. Trafalgar, which arrived here on Sunday last, from the Island of St. Christopher, reported, that—On the day he sailed (Dec. 7.) the mail boat from Barbadoes was said to have brought letters, &c. received at that Island by the packet from Falmouth, with the first November Mail.

The Continental intelligence thus received from Great-Britain, was stated to be far more pleasing than the previous accounts:—The Prussians, supported by a formidable body of Russian troops, were said to have obtained some important advantages over the French invading army.

Large reinforcements have arrived at Barbadoes; an Expedition was preparing against some of the enemy's possessions—its destination was generally supposed to be Martinique.

Extract of a letter from an officer of rank, dated St. John's, Newfoundland, Dec. 15.

“The thoughts of peace are fled—Bonaparte, on the 15th of Oct. demanded an interview with the King of Prussia; which was refused.

“We are to furnish Prussia with a subsidy of £3,000,000 sterl.—30,000 infantry and 4,000 cavalry,

“Two expeditions have sailed with large reinforcements for Buenos Ayres; and another was preparing to be commanded by Col. Crawford.”

Captain Elbridge, arrived at Wilmington, N. C. from Barbadoes, reports, that on the 30th Oct. the morning after his sailing he was boarded by the British frigate Seine, with General Miranda on board, and informed that after an unsuccessful attack on the Maine, Miranda had purchased a ship of 18 guns, which he sent to Trinidad, and came on board the Seine frigate bound to Barbadoes to see the admiral.—Nov. 6, lat. 21, 20, N. long. 66 15, W. at day light saw a disabled ship to windward bearing down for us—she proved to be a British frigate with her main top-gallant-mast and fore top-mast carried away by the board, her rigging hanging promiscuously about her waist, and dragging over board, and all hands busily employed in clearing the wreck—being hove to on the opposite tack; we drew some distance apart, expecting her boat on board, but we were ordered by a signal to make sail; and being then out of hail, pursued our voyage without information of the frigate's misfortune.

Whereas information has been received of Trespass having been committed on His Majesty's Woods: The following Extract from the Statutes, for the preservation of His Majesty's Woods in America, is republished by order of the Surveyor General of His Majesty's Woods in America, for public information, with notice that they will be strictly carried into execution.

BY 8 Geo. 1. ch. 12, it is enacted, That every Person who shall presume to cut down, fell or destroy any White Pine Tree, within His Majesty's Province of Nova-Scotia, or any other of the Colonies in America, or be aiding and assisting therein, shall for every such offence forfeit and pay the following Sum, viz.—

For every White Pine Tree of Twelve Inches Diameter, and three Foot Growth from the Earth,	£ 5 0 0
From 12 to 18 Inches	10 0 0
18 to 24	20 0 0
24 and upwards,	50 0 0

To be recovered in the Courts of Admiralty.

It is further enacted, That all White Pine Trees, Masts, and Logs made from such Trees, which shall be found cut or felled without Licence, shall be forfeited and seized for the King.

By 2d Geo. ch. 35, it is enacted, That no Person within the Province of Nova-Scotia, or any other of the Colonies that now belong or hereafter shall belong to the Crown of Great Britain, shall presume to cut down, fell or destroy any White Pine Trees, notwithstanding the said trees do grow within the Limits of any Township laid out or to be laid out hereafter, without His Majesty's Royal Licence for so doing first had and obtained, on Penalty of the Forfeitures mentioned in Act 8. Geo. 1.

BY order of His Excellency Sir JOHN WENTWORTH, Bart. Surveyor General of His Majesty's Woods in America, I have caused this Extract from the Statutes for the preservation of His Majesty's timber, to be again published here,—And I have received his positive instructions to prosecute with the utmost rigour, every person who shall presume to cut down, fell, or destroy any White Pine Tree within this Province without Licence for so doing, first had and obtained.
