Paris, Aug. 6—Italy has replied to Germany's ultimatum, with a statement that Germany was the aggressor in the conflict with England and France, and sees no necessity for altering her decision to remain neutral. This is according to a Rome despatch received by a news agency here today.

Brussels, Aug. 6—Two disguised German officers to-day at Ostead, had in their possession extensive military notes and plans of great value. They are to be shot.

London, Aug. 6—The Bank of England today reduced its discount rate to six per cent.

### GERMANY MAY PROCEED AGAINST ITALY

London, Aug. 6—War against Italy is today expected to be the next declaration of the Kaiser. An ultimatum has been sent to King Emanuel in which Italy is called to live up to her obligations under the alliance.

Falmouth, Eng. Aug. 6—The German liner Prince Adelbert was seized by the government in the harbor tonight.

Tokio, Aug. 7—It is reported that German warships have captured a vessel belonging to the Russian volunteer fleet.
