Henry Harvey Stuart.

The accompanying picture is that of Bro. Henry Harvey Stuart, a young man in his twenty-third year, a native of Northfield, Sunbury Co., N. B., but since 1887 a citizen of Fredericton. He followed the printing business from 1888 to 1893, then attended the Provincial Normal school, and since August, 1894 has been teaching. He first taught in Red Rock, York Co., in 1895; and is now principal of the School at McAdam Junction.

Brother Stuart is an active temperance worker. He joined the R. T. of T. in 1892, and in 1893 was elected secretary of Banner City Council, of Fredericton. In 1895 he became a member of Benton Council, No. 74. R. T. T., and is now



Past Councillor of that body. In June, 1895, he was chosen representative of Benton Council at the Grand Council for the Maritime Provinces held at Amherst, N. S. last July. In Carleton County he took an active part in favor of the Independent Prohibitionist candidate then in the political field; supporting the latter's cause on the public platform, as well as at the district council of the Royal Templars. Mr Stuart has also frequently addressed public temperance meetings in the city of Fredericton and elsewhere in York County.

This year his attention has been directed to further the cause of the I. O. G. T., and he has succeeded in organizing a new and vigorous lodge of twenty-one charter members at McAdam Junction, although the Royal Templar Society once established there had lately collapsed. On

the 2nd instant he was unanimously elected delegate to represent Waring Lodge, No. 341 I. O. G. T. at Grand Lodge in Kingston, Kings Co., on the 2nd July next.

Bro. Stuart is secretary of the Order of Unity at McAdam and also of the Railway Men's Christian Association there.

Besides his other employment the subject of our sketch finds time for a certain amount of journalistic work, mostly in the shape of poetry, specimens of which during the last twelve months have appeared in nearly every paper in the province, and in papers of Ontario, Maine and Ohio.
