Mrs. Allan, "Sappho," wore a loose Grecian dress of cream colored canvas, embroidered cloth around the bottom with gold braid, fastened at the waist with a silver chain giraffe, low neck and no sleeves, heavy gold bands on the arms, gold chain on the neck. Her hair was worn in the Grecian knot with gold bands around the front of the head and the dress was carried a tye. This was a very graceful and pretty costume, and Mrs. Allan looked well in it.

Mrs. George Allan: Court dress, petticoat and blue sash with large beautiful hand-painted pattern on the front, cream lace draperies, head-dress trimmed with pearls, pearl necklace.

Mrs. Forrester, "Eloise": Her dress was one-half white satin and the other black satin, low bodice and short sleeves, plain skirt and full waist; the division of colors was made from the neck to the bottom of the dress, one side being entirely black while the other was white; hair powdered.

Miss Lelia Botsford, "Coral Girl": Red skirt, white blouse and red berouze lined with white; large white straw hat, with red feathers; necklace of coral.

Miss Harrison, "Toxopholia, the Goddess of Archery": Short white dress, decorated around the bottom with blue and white targets; a round white hat, with a target crown and a bunch of quill darts; she carried a bow. Miss Harrison is a very pretty blonde, with long light hair, which was allowed to flow down her back, and she looked exceedingly well.

Mrs. McLaren, Kate Greenaway costume, made of red, with white spotted muslin over it; a red tulle top.

Miss Wetmore, "Peak Freat": Garnet velvet short skirt, white blouse low neck and short sleeves; handsome Roman cash around the waist and striped hose; a hair down over the shoulders.

Mrs. Jeannie Miller, "Undine": Grecian dress of cream cashmere, with a gold giraffe, low neck and no sleeves, large gold bands on the arms; the shoulders were caught up with gold chains, hair powdered, gold bands around the head, the bottom of the dress embroidered with gold braid. This was also a very pretty costume.

Mrs. Byron Winslow, Roman Peasant: Red cashmere skirt, with rows of black and gold braid, and sequins the bottom of skirt, which was short; Zouave jacket of black velvet, embroidered with gold braid and gold fringe over a pale blue satin blouse, turban trimmed with sequins.

Mrs. Scoville, "Britannia": Dress made of flags, jockey cap with two small flags in it, a brooch with the Queen's head and a medal at the throat. This is a hard costume to describe, but was very pretty.

Mrs. Montgomery, "Housemaid": Dark dress, with long white apron and white cap, and carried a feather duster.

Mrs. MacNeill, Equestrienne: Dark riding habit and high silk hat; carried whip.

Miss Powys: Fancy dress, pink silk and pink feathers.

Mrs. Clements, "Ye Olden Times": Cream mill, with brown spray, plain skirt, short waist; cap same as dress.

Mrs. Mabel Murray (of Chatham), "Night": Black tulle, trimmed with silver stars, low neck, short sleeves, caught upon shoulders with silver crescent; crescent on head.

Mrs. M. T. Tibbitts, "Caucasian Girl": White gauze skirt with old rose border, gauze blouse with white silk vest; dark green satin zouave jacket, trimmed sequins and embroidery; head-dress of green satin and cut steel; ornamental sach of embroidered crapes.

Mrs. O'Malley, "Morning": Blue silk dress with tulle over-dress trimmed with gold stars, a gold sun on the head, tulle veil.

Miss Winslow, Diana: Pink striped gauze dress, trimmed with gold crescents around the bottom of short skirt, low neck and sleeves, caught on the shoulders with sequins, crescent on the head, gold shield on the breast, quiver with arrows strapped on the back with pink ribbon, carried a bow. A very pretty costume.

Mrs. Fred Fisher, "Sunflower": White dress, trimmed around the bottom of skirt with large sunflowers, baby waist, low neck and short sleeves, large sunflower on the head.

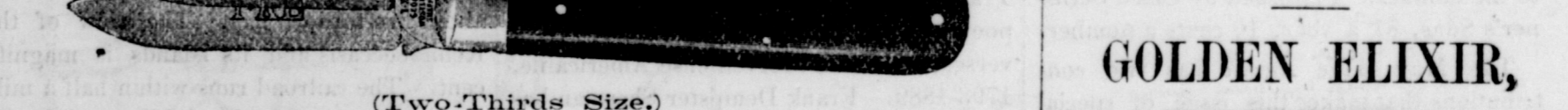
