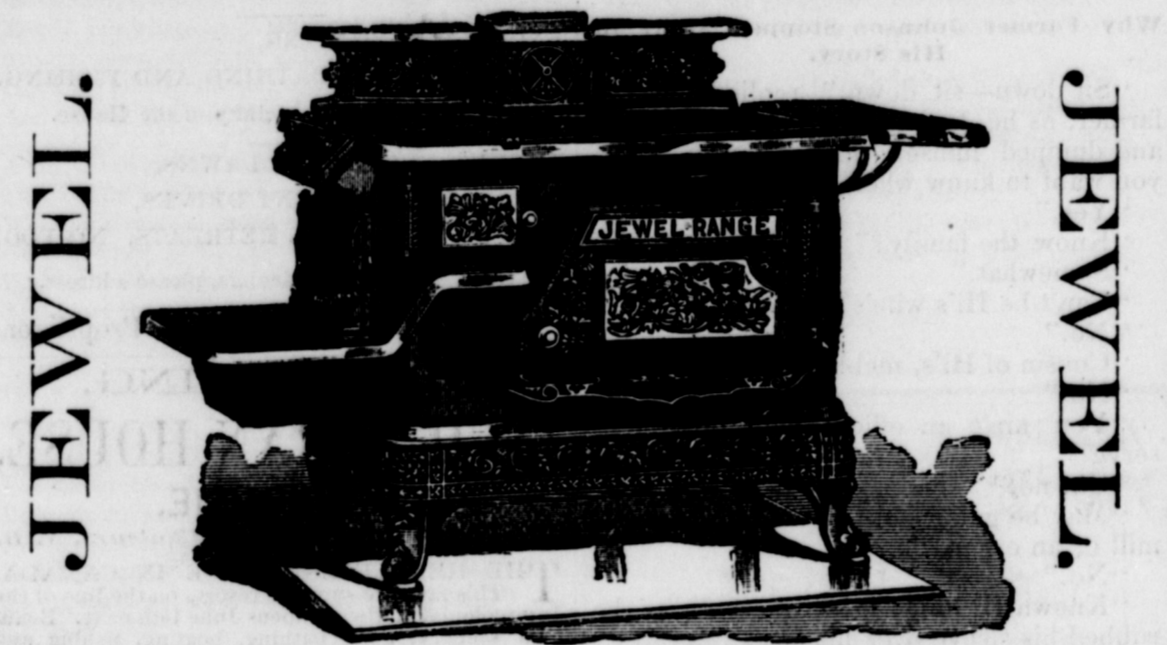

The Bovine Case Decided.

After a long and tedious legal fight, Messrs. Hanson & McLaughlin have had the case decided in their favor by a jury composed of Messrs. Carson, Flood, W. Tremaine Gard, James Manson, T. O'Brien, Stephen Thorne, W. R. Russell and Chas. K. Cameron.

The issues in the Bovine case were submitted to the jury last evening and were answered in favor of Hanson and McLaughlin, the defendants. The jury found that the defendants had not so put up, advertised or sold the article of their manufacture in such a manner as to lead the public to believe it was the article manufactured by the plaintiff company, and that they have not been guilty of a fraudulent imitation of the plaintiffs' registered trade mark.

The trade mark registered by the plaintiffs is "Bovine," a fancy term, and the name adopted by the defendants is "Bovine"—an ordinary English word. The defendants claim that both parties manufacture from the same recipe, and that while they desire to preserve a suitable name for the article, they freely admit that that sold by them is of their own manufacture.
