The bookkeepers and clerks have to earn your prompt attention. their pay. A large club has from 700 to 2,000 resident and non-resident members. Many of the members have the same surnames. In the old clubs, where all the male members of a family belong to the same club, the same names recur often. The clerks must learn all these signatures. This is harder wok than in a bank. A man usually signs his bank checks in the same way. He uses the same pen and ink. At a club signatures vary. The signature to a breakfast voucher and the signature to the last bar voucher do not have much resemblance. The ink signature to a carefully drawn up dinner bill and the scribbled name in pencil on a voucher held on the lid of a cigar box do not look alike. The most unintelligible signatures come in late at night. Some of these are undecipherable, but the clerk always has the recourse of asking the waiter whom he served. If the waiter does not know he can find out from the door-tender, who writes the names of every visitor in a book, and knows the name and face of every .nan who comes in.

The clerks and bookkeepers have a set of pigeonholes or small drawers. They put the unpaid vouchers there after they have been entered in the books. The vouchers of each member are put by themselves at the end of the month. The vouchers are sorted out carefully and returned to the member when he pays his bill, if he wants them. Few members regularly ask for them, as they assume that the clerks keep the accounts straight. Still the voucher system makes it possible for every member to verify his charges. Some members write out the cost of the items of a dinner when they write out the dinner order. This is not common. The amounts are usually filled in by the clerks after comparision with the bill of fare for the day. The clerks often make mistakes the member's favor and against him. On

the whole, they are probably a gain to the club. The old members are more careful about the items than the young members. The rich members always go over their accounts very carefully and are more likely to find fault than the poor members. This may be because they are rich, or it may be that they are rich because it is their habit to be careful about money matters. At the end of the month a notice is sent

to each member telling him what he owes. This notice is printed so that a member can see that it was not intented to hurt his feelings by asking him for money, but that everybody is treated in the same way. The names, amount, and date are the only blanks on the printed form. They are filled in ink by the clerks and bookkeepers.
