WHO IS YOUR FAVORITE!

Among the Players in the St. Johns and Shamrock Ball Clubs.

They will examine the ballot boxes, lock them and take care that they are not opened except on Thursday evening of each week, when the ballots will be counted and the result announced in PROGRESS, Saturday.

SPORTS OF THE SEASON.

It has been hinted that White's services have not been appreciated; that even the management has regarded him with a cold critical eye, and that the public has caught its cue from that august body. Such a statement was a surprise to me, for the enthusiasm of the people over White was too evident for question. He had always played an elegant game, and, while I condemn his action in leaving, I give him all credit for the best all around work of any one of the nine. He was built for an athlete, and if he had chosen to follow base ball as a profession he would have ranked with the first.

The defeat of the Shamrocks by Moncton is another of the season's surprises. It proves, however, that Moncton has been in it all the time, and a little better luck would have pulled her to the front. If the St. Johns had met the Smokey city team as often as the Shamrocks have they might have bowed to them, too. The game on Tuesday would not indicate such a result, but then we must remember that the boys are not always slugging or in such a fighting mood as on that day.

Sexton sized the St. Johns up to a nicety when he remarked that they were the best batters in the league, but the trouble was that they wanted to "murder" the ball.

In this connection, let me give a wee bit of advice to the president. Don't put a premium on home runs when a sacrifice will tie the score!

Dudley Dean could not come to St. John. He would have been a daisy, but the fates were against the St. Johns that time.

I understand that the Monctons were to pay Burns, their new man, \$300 for the balance of the season. Big figures! They must have been very tired Tuesday night.

There was a heap of money up on Thursday's game. No matter how the games result the friends of both teams seem confident of victory next time, and will take no bluffing.

Before this appears the Shamrocks will have met the "all amateur" Haligonians.

The Halifax people will see some good ball playing, and if their nine wins, even with Burns pitching for them, they will have every reason to be proud.

There has been a very interesting wordy war going on in the sporting papers this season, between the friends of the Brotherhood and the National league. Both institutions are still losing money, and "padding" the attendance up to an extraordinary pitch. In this the National league and Brotherhood differ widely from the New Brunswick institution. The attendance doesn't seem to have much to do with the matter, in St. John at any rate. New Brunswickers are more interested in the league standing, and as a result the receipts are large enough to look after themselves. If the newspaper accounts of the attendance were official, and an opposition league on hand, wouldn't there be a great opportunity for charges of "padding," though?
