"More than that?"

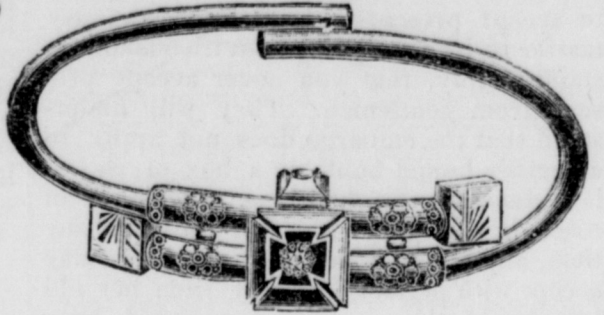
"No, it won't do." She weights ever so much
