



#### JOHN WILSON, Assessors URIAH DRAKE, RICHARD FARMER, Taxes. Extracts from "The St. John City Assessment Act of 1889." SEC. 118 .- "The Assessors shall ascertain, as nearly as possible, the particulars of the real estate, the ' personal estate and the income of any person who " has not brought in a statement in accordance with "their notice and as required by this law, and shall

make an estimate thereof, at the true value and amount to the best of their information and belief; and such estimate shall be conclusive upon all per-sons who have not filed their statements in due 'time, unless they can show a reasonable excuse for the omission."

SEC. 138 .- "No person shall have an abatement 'unless he has filed with the Assessors the state-" ment, under oath, within the time hereinbefore " required; nor shall the Common Council in any " such case sustain an appeal from the judgment of the Assessors unless they shall be satisfied that 'there was good cause why the statement was not 'filed in due time, as herein provided." 4-5-1m.
