

Aug. 12 .- To begin on any other subject than the all absorbing one of the wedding, would be wasted labor, since no one would read it, but rather skip all the carefully prepared details and hurry on to the wedding. as the small boys skip the meat and vegetables on the menu, and rush headlong into the pudding. Of course the event has been looked forward to for some time, and many society people who were at the seaside returned on Saturday in anticipation thereof.

Tuesday morning dawned bright and fair, an ideal summer's day, rather warm, but still as perfect a wedding day as the most exacting bride could wish for, and before five o'clock St. George's church had begun to fill with brightly clad guests until it resembled a garden. As usual the fair sex predominated, but yet there was a very plentiful sprinkling of black coats to preserve the solemnity of the occasion, and prevent the scene from being too gay. The church was intensely warm, and even the joys of anticipation failed to distract people's attention sufficiently from their immediate surroundings to keep them reasonably cool. Mr. Fred Blair, the boy organist of St. Andrews church, St. John, who presided at the organ, played a brilliant voluntary before the entrance of the bridegroom, but even music failed to soothe the panting breasts of the congregation, and fans were merely a mitigating circumstance. Punc tually at half-past five the bridegroom, accompanied by his groomsman, Mr. Whitehead, of Halifax, emerged from the vestry, and immediately the heat became less oppressive. The nervousness one usually associates with the necessary, but less important adjunct to a wedding, was conspicuously absent from Mr. Blair's demeanor. Calm in the midst of excitement, he chatted with his groomsman as composedly as if it had been some one else's wedding instead of his own, until "The Voice that Breathed O'er Eden" announced the coming of the bride, who entered slowly, leaning on the arm of her brother, Mr. J. D. Weldon, of Shediac. The bridal procession was a very im-posing one. First came the six ushers, Messrs. E. W. Jarvis, J. F. Grant, Arthur Boyd, and Bert Taylor, of the Bank of Montreal, and Messrs. W. W. Wells and J. H. Harris. Next came the little maids of honor, the Misses Mary Ryan and Minnie Weldon, nieces of the bride, dressed in embroidered white muslin, with pink ribbons and pink Greenaway bonnets, carrying baskets of pink flowers. Then the bridesmaids, Miss Harris. of Moncton, and Miss Biair, of Chatham, sister of the groom, wearing very beautiful dresses of pale pink silk, with overdresses of pink crepe de chine, trimmed with silver fringe, veils of palest pink tulle, and carrying bouquets of white and pink roses, The bride's dress was lovely. It was of white bengaline silk, trimmed with ostrich trimwhite bengame sik, trimmed with ostich trim-ming, very long train, veil and orange blossoms, with bouquet of bridal roses, white carnations and maiden hair fern. Miss Weldon looked very charming, but more like a lily than a rose, unless it were a bridal rose, for she was the traditional "pale, sweet bride' rather than the more modern blushing one. The group at the church had been beautifully

decorated, communion rails formed a striking picture.
