

Captain Vowell made an ideal Lord Beaufoy; his acting was better than that of the average profes-sional by a very long way, and he looked the part to perfection. His voice is very good; his enunciation particularly clear and distinct; in his whole part there was never the least word unheard by the audiparticularly clear and united in the particularly clear and unheard by the sudi-ence. He was perfectly natural in all his move-mens, which is not given to every *jeune premier* to be; and in the last scene he fatrly brought down the house. Mr. W. A. Henry, who kindly took the part of Dr. Satcliffe at very short notice, was exceedingly good, and his make-up most artistic. The "old Adam" though, showed out through the clerical schoolmaster, when he threatened to strike Krux Mr. Henry had a round of applause as a smile ran through the house at the wonderfully athletic principal of a girl's school. Beau Farintosp was at first almost unrecog-nizable for Capt. Duffus, so very thorough was his disguise. Captain Duffus has proved himself very clever by his rendition of an extremely hard part, with more real acting in it than any other in the disguise. Captain Duffus has proved missenvery clever by his rendition of an extremely hard part, with more real acting in it than any other in the play, except possibly that of Krux, and he did his work well as the doddering old man who insists upon being young. He had disguised his staiwart physique very fairly, and we shall all be glad to see him on the stage again. If Captain Duffus' acting was perhaps a little variable as the "Beau," one must remember that, excepting, perhaps Mr. Fuller, he is the only actor we have who could even have attempted it, much more, made a success of it, as Captain Duffus certainly did! "Jack Poyntz" was not, perhaps, as good as the others, but a part in which one has only to be natural when the weight of stage manage-ment is on one's shoulders, is not too casy. He certainly made Miss Tighe a very charming lover, which that lady as certainly deserved. A more fresh and delightful impersonation of a young girl has seldom been scen on any stage; in Halifax, never! 


