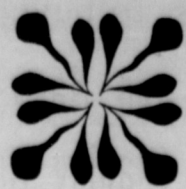
WOODSTOCK.

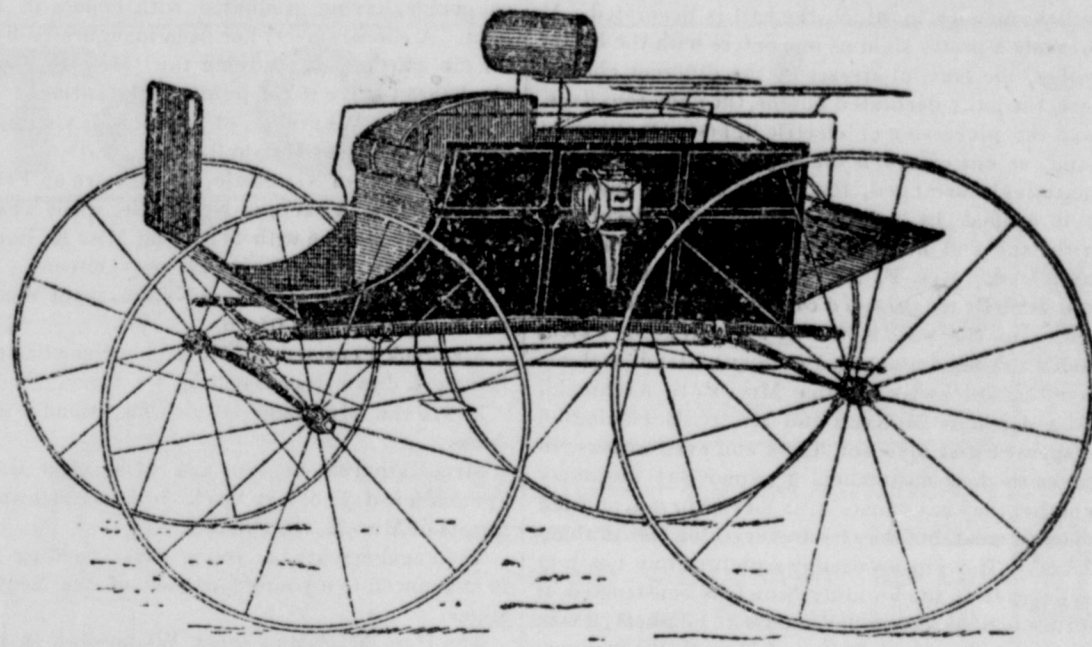
