The mission closed with solemn high mass at ten o'clock on Sunday morning, renewal of baptismal vows and papal ben ediction. In the evening the Rev. Father Dougherty, of the order of the Jesuits, lectured in the church to a very large congregation, many of whom were protestants, the subject being "The Church." The lecturer handled his subject in a masterly manner, the only drawback being the difficulty of hearing him in the rear of the church. I am afraid the acoustic properties of St. Bernards leave something to be desired, as I have frequently noticed the strained attention which is necessary in order to catch even the clear, and resonant utterances of Father Mehan. The lecture occupied 55 minutus in its delivery, and was listened to throughout with the deepest attention. The text, if one with the deepest attention. The text, if one may use the word in connection with a lecture, was contained in the admonition, "Go ye and teach," the idea embodied being that it was not the scripture which gave the church to the world since the church had existed, for seven years before the first word of the New Testament was written, so that faith came by hearing and not by sight, the church giving us the scrip-tures. The lecturer quoted the words of St. Augustine, "Except I had the authority of the catholic church for the gospel, I would not believe it." This is rather a new idea to the protestant mind, and would naturally require some time for proper assimilation by those who have been accustomed to regard the scriptures as the one paramount authority. Of course the speakers arguments went to prove that the Roman catholic church was the one true church founded by Christ and his apostles, and the importance of belonging to the same. The Roman catholic church, he said, never changed; it was always the same, in England, Asia, Africa, Canada and the United States. It taught the same doctrines, administered the same rites, and was in all respects the true church of God. The service was concluded by the administration of the benedic-tion of the blessed sacrament.


