Mr. Justice Townsend left on Saturday last, for England, in the Labrador, by which Colonel and Mrs. Hill, were also passengers.

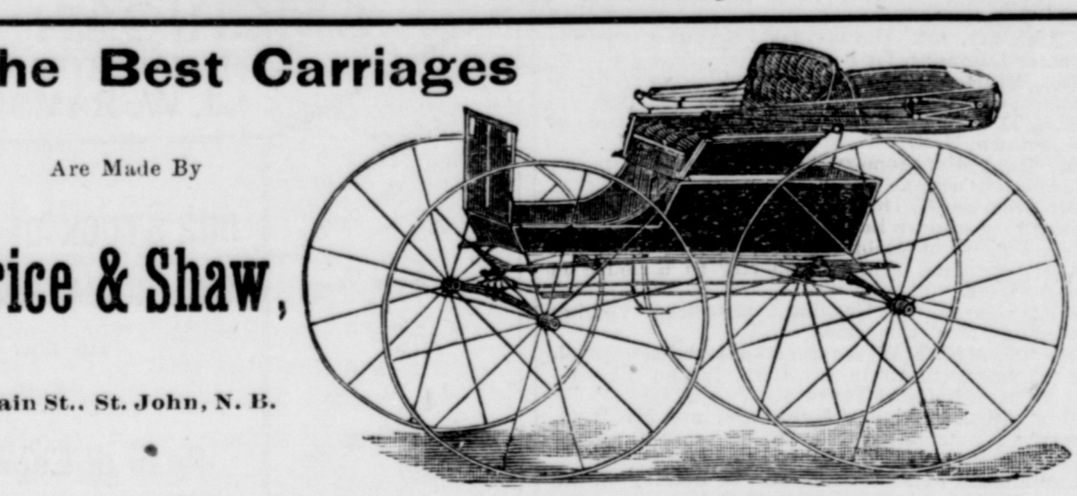
