Mr. P. McCann, of St. John, was at the Eureka Monday evening enroute south and left for Moncton yesterday morning.

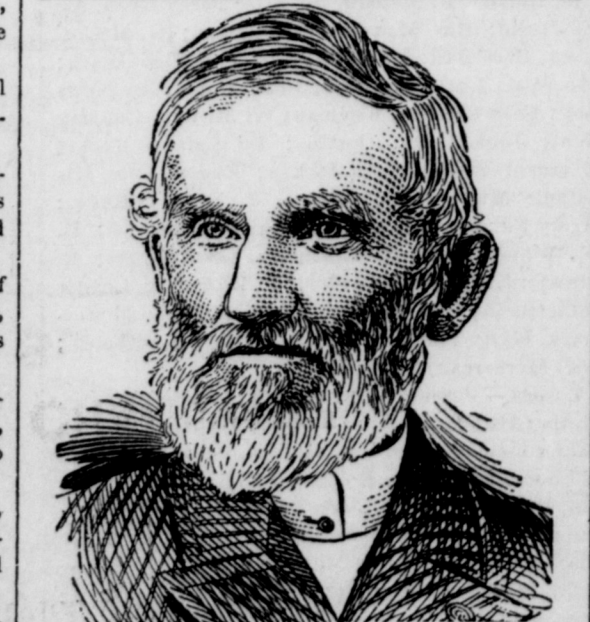
Dr. R. P. Doherty, of Moncton, was here two days last week, and departed for Kingston on Saturday.

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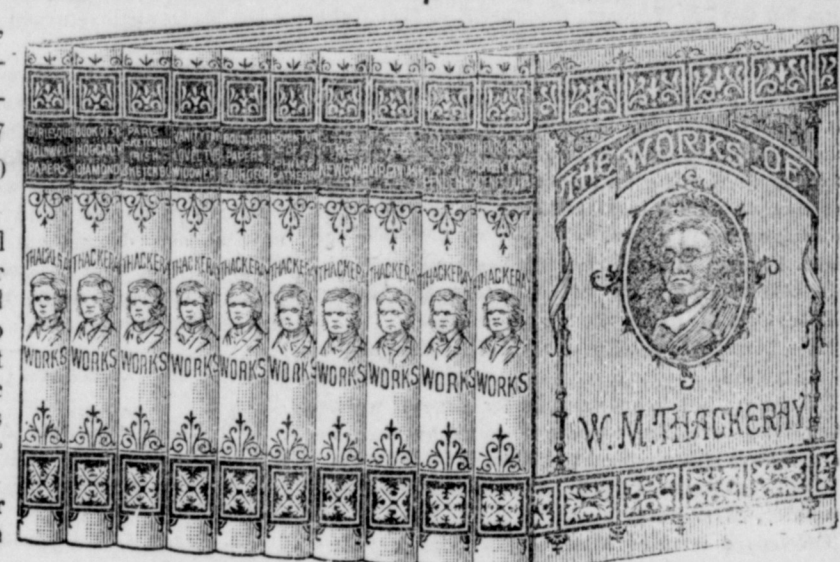
