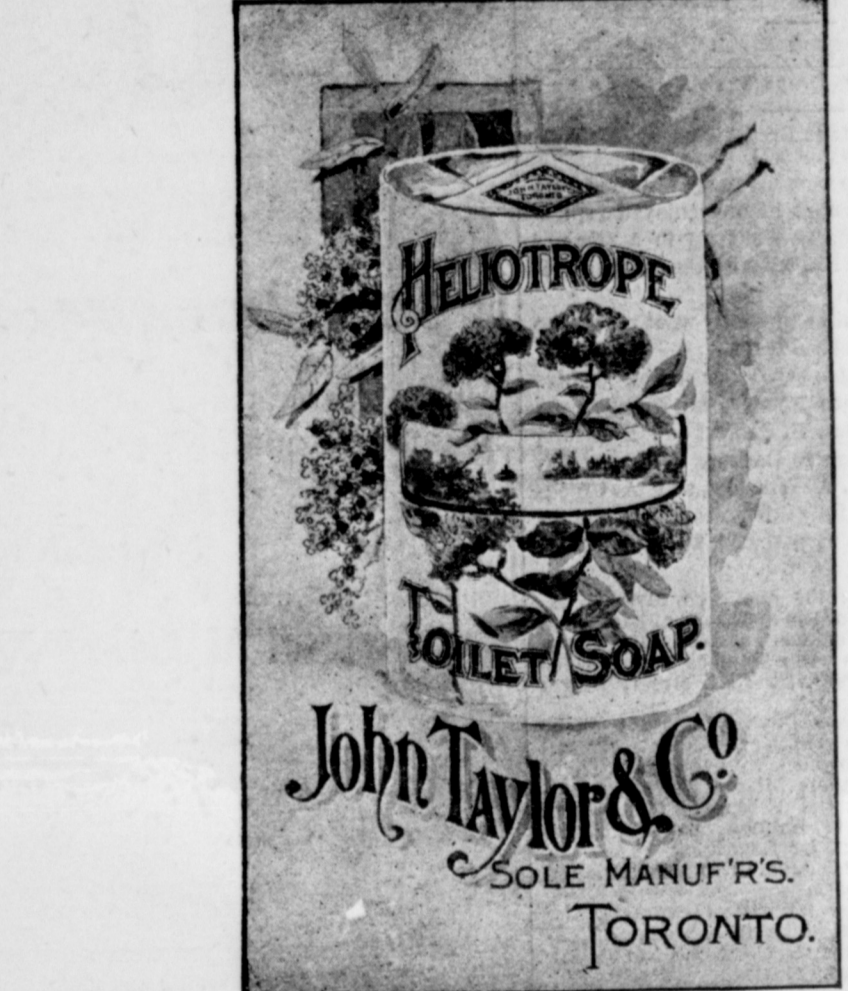

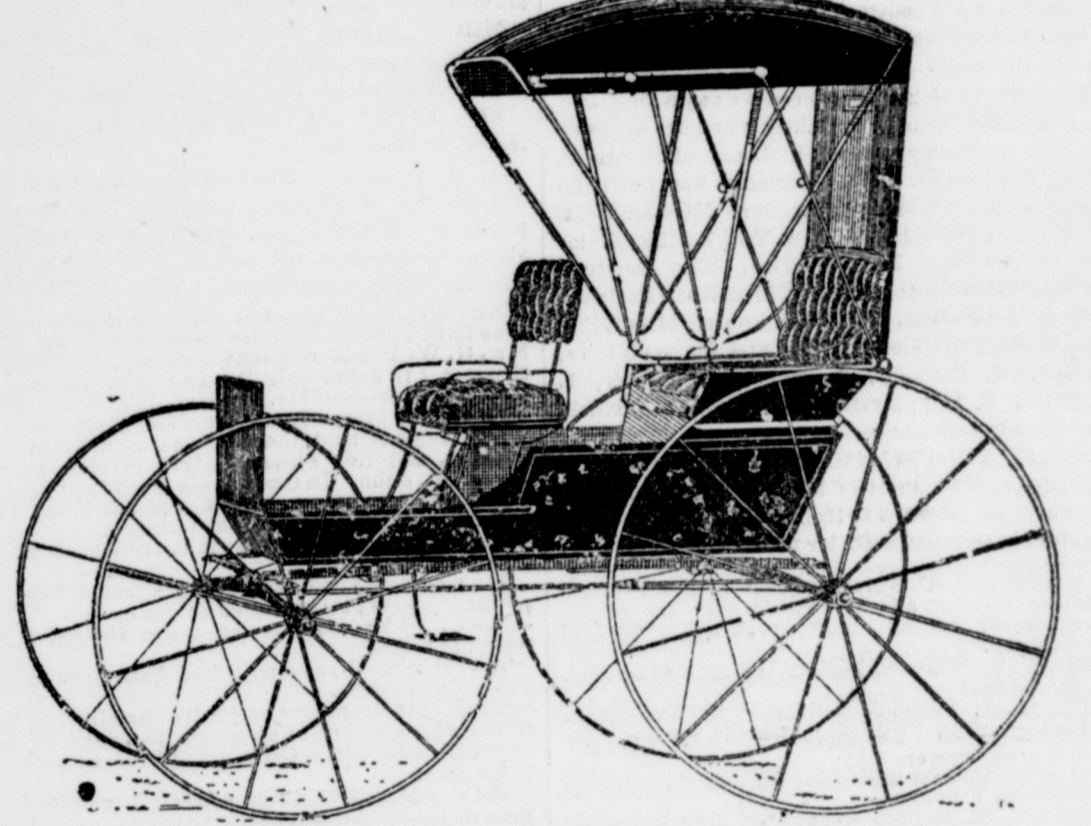
Aug. 15.—Mr. and Mrs. Botsford Turner have returned from Boston after a prolonged absence.
