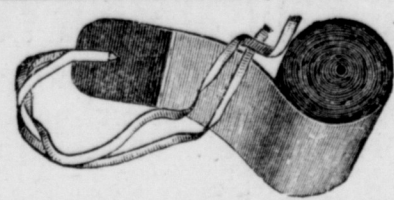

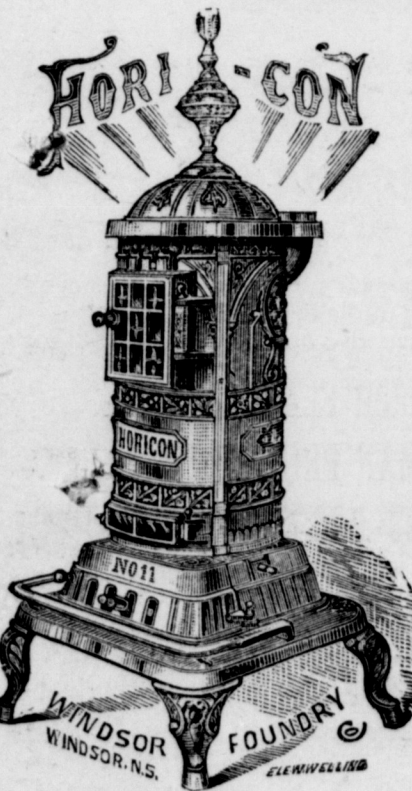
PETTIJOHN'S BREAKFAST FOOD, which is a favorite morning dish with so many people, is on our shelves again.
