

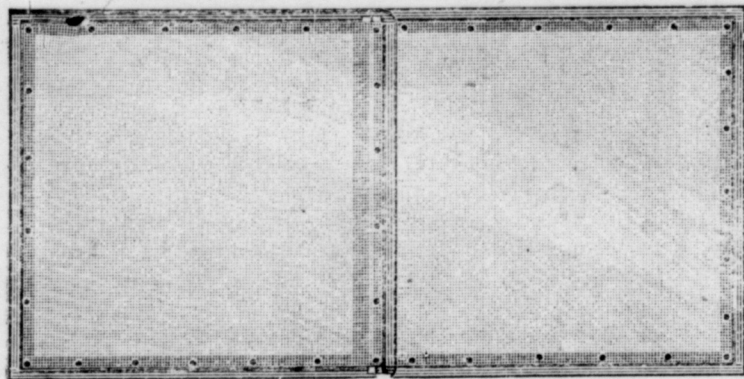

St. John--South End.

The death of Mrs. William Beverly Robinson, which occurred at her residence, Duke street, on Saturday last, was a great shock to her many friends both in this city, and Fredericton, where she had spent many years.

After an illness of several weeks, from an attack of pneumonia, it was thought she was recovering, when a sudden turn for the worse, on Friday last, resulted fatally the next morning, her death being occasioned by rapid consumption. Of her five daughters, and two sons, only three were with her when she passed away, Mrs. McDonald, of Halifax, Mrs. Powys, of Fredericton, and Mr. Beverly Robinson of Boston did not arrive till the day following her death.

Mrs. Robinson was much beloved by a very large circle of relatives and friends, who will mourn her sad loss. She was the widow of Major W. B. Robinson, whose death occurred some 20 years ago, and daughter of the late George J. Dibblee, of Fredericton. Mrs. Robinson leaves three sisters, Mrs. Morris Robinson, of this city, Mrs. George Chandler, of Dorchester, and Miss Dibblee, who is at present visiting friends in England.

The sad death, (a little more than a year ago,) of her son, Captain William Robinson, Royal Engineer, will be remembered; he having been killed in action at Sierra Leone.

The funeral took place on Tuesday last, and was very largely attended, four of the pall bearers being sons-in-law of the deceased, namely, Mr. Fred Allison, Mr. McDonald, Mr. Percy Powys and Mr. J. W. Y. Smith, the other two were, Mr. Morris Robinson and Mr. G. Ludlow Robinson, relatives. The funeral services were held in Trinity church, where a large congregation assembled. The floral tributes were very numerous.
