Sept.—Naught except the celebration of the harvest festival here this week commanded the least attention and I might observe that as everyone owned in the festivities with a vigor almost unprecedented, other matters were temporarily shelved. The special service in St. Martin's church Sunday morning was attended by a congregation that filled the edifice to overflowing. Every seat was filled and a large number of extra chairs in the aisles were occupied. The interior of the church was beautifully and tastefully decorated with grain, cut flowers, potted plants, fruits, vegetables, mosses and leaves. A wreath of grain, interspersed by bunches of shrubby and red berries encircled the space above the chancel. Plants, moss and white berries adorned the windows above the communion table. An array of cut flowers graced the latter. The pulpit was hung with a cluster of grapes and a bunch of hops artistically arranged on a white background. The church pillars were entwined with wreaths of grain based on sheaves of wheat, oats and barley. The latter were relieved with autumn leaves, red berries, etc. The windows were prettily decorated with wreaths of corn, grain, and a ground work of moss and fruit on the sills. Two immense specimens of ivy covered the founts and plants and vegetables were arranged in various other parts of the church. The work occupied two days and was done by the ladies of the congregation, the pastor and two or three male assistants. The congregation is indebted to the choir of St. Andrew's church for rare and high class music. Amos and St. Quentin's "Gloria in Excelsis" was given with pleasing effect by Miss Carrie Smith, H. H. Smeiter, violinist and Mrs. J. D. Weldon, organist. Rev. A. F. Burdette preached an eloquent and appropriate sermon on Psalms, cxvii, 13.
A special service was also held on Monday evening at the Madras school here, but no principal of the church, Moncton. The latter presided an interesting sermon on Psalms, cxvii, 11.
