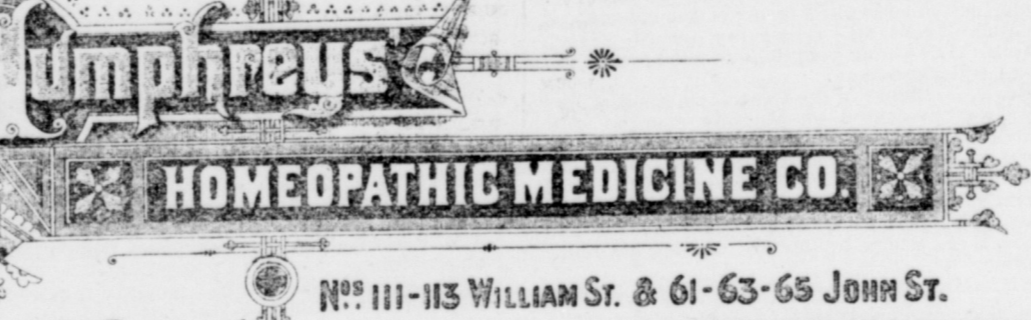

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GREENWICH.

MAY 2.—The death of J. Albert Whelpley, occurred at Keene, N. H., and the remains were brought here, accompanied by the family, on Tuesday last. The funeral, which was one of the largest ever seen in Greenwich, took place on Wednesday.

The funeral sermon was preached by the Rev. D. W. Pickett, who took his text from 118 psalm and 23 verse. The remains were interred in the Methodist cemetery at Brown's Flat.

Mr. Whelpley's death is a sad loss to the community and the public at large. The floral tributes were many and beautiful. Mrs. Whelpley and her son and daughter who survive him, have the heartfelt sympathy of a very large circle of relatives and friends in their sudden and overwhelming bereavement.

The following is copied from the Keene evening Sentinel: "The funeral of the late James A. Whelpley was held yesterday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock at the parlor of the city hotel, was largely attended. Rev. Dr. Harrington of the first congregational church officiated and selections were sung by a male quartette. The floral offerings were abundant and costly. The John P. Lowell arms company of Boston, the selling agent of the Keene manufacturing company, of which Mr. Whelpley was superintendent, sent a standing cross of ivory with a wreath of mixed flowers. Mrs. M. E. Winchester and family of this city gave a casket. The Keene manufacturing company, a beautiful broken column of daybreak pillar and cut flowers, and by accident, Easter carnations and roses, with base of roses. From Misses, Biles of the valley, and by accident, From Mrs. Whelpley's old home, where the funeral services were held, came at least forty friends. Many of them employees of the company. The pallbearers, six in number, were also from among the officers and employees of the Keene manufacturing company. After the funeral services the remains were taken to the station and at 3.31 started on the long journey to Greenwich, New Brunswick, Mr. Whelpley's old home, where the funeral services will be held Wednesday and interment will take place. When the train was about to leave the depot the officers and employees of the Keene manufacturing company formed in line upon Main street alongside the train and, as the car containing the body of Mr. Whelpley passed, they lifted their hats and stood with uncovered heads in honor of their late associate and employer."
